Lucado often says that the greatest problem in the world is not poverty, disease, or war—it is that we do not believe how much God loves us. He points to John 3:16 as the definitive proof. In his book, he tells the story of a woman who felt unlovable after a lifetime of mistakes. When she read "For God so loved the

world," Lucado asked her to put her name in the blank: "For God so loved [her name]." That simple exercise broke through years of shame.

Shall Not Perish but Have Eternal Life – The Certain Hope

Lucado often tackles the fear of death head-on. He says that John 3:16 is God's answer to our deepest anxiety: the fear of annihilation. Eternal life is not just a future promise; it is a

present reality for those who believe. He uses the metaphor of a child on a sinking ship being rescued by a lifeboat. Once on the lifeboat, the child is safe; the perishing is behind them. Similarly, for the believer, the guarantee of eternal life removes the sting of death.
