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STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE TO MAKING THE PERFECT FISH**PIE**

Preparation: Getting Your Ingredients Ready

Now, drain your boiled potatoes and mash them with a knob of butter, a splash of milk, and a generous handful of grated Parmesan. Spread the mash evenly over the fish mixture, using a fork to create peaks and ridges. These will crisp up beautifully in the oven. For an extra golden finish, scatter a little more Parmesan on top.

Baking to Perfection

Place the assembled pie in a preheated oven at 190°C (375°F) and bake for about 30 to 35 minutes, until the topping is golden and bubbling at the edges. The aroma that fills your kitchen during this final stage is nothing short of wonderful. Allow the pie to rest for a few minutes before serving, as this helps the filling set slightly and makes for cleaner portions.

NUTRITIONAL BENEFITS OF JAMIE OLIVER'S FISH PIE

Beyond its comforting taste and ease of preparation, the Ministry of Food fish pie is also a genuinely nutritious meal. White fish is an excellent source of lean protein, essential for muscle repair and overall health. It is also rich in iodine and selenium, minerals that support thyroid function and immune health. The potatoes, when eaten with their skins (if you choose to leave them on), offer additional fibre and potassium. Even the butter and milk, in moderation, supply calcium and fat-soluble vitamins. VARIATIONS AND ADAPTATIONS FOR MODERN COOKS

Making It Lighter

Adding extra vegetables, such as spinach or peas, will boost the fibre content while keeping the dish satisfying.

Going Gluten-Free

For those with gluten sensitivities, the recipe is easy to adapt. Simply replace the plain flour with a gluten-free alternative, such as rice flour or a gluten-free blend. Ensure that the smoked haddock you buy is not cured with any gluten-containing ingredients, and check that your stock cubes (if used) are gluten-free. The rest of the ingredients are naturally free from gluten.

Seafood Swaps

The beauty of this fish pie is that it welcomes whatever sustainable seafood you can find. Salmon fillets work wonderfully, adding a richer flavour and beautiful colour. For a more luxurious version, you could include a handful of peeled prawns or even some sustainable scallops. Smoked mackerel is another bold choice that brings a distinct smoky taste, though it is stronger than smoked haddock, so use it sparingly.

Vegetarian and Vegan Options

While a fish pie is obviously centred on seafood, you can create a plant-based version that captures the same comforting spirit. Replace the fish with chunks of firm tofu, artichoke hearts, or a mix of mushrooms and leeks. Use a plant-based milk and a vegan butter substitute for the sauce and mash. Nutritional yeast can

stand in for Parmesan, lending a cheesy, umami flavour to the topping.

THE LEGACY OF THE MINISTRY OF FOOD CAMPAIGN

The Jamie Oliver Ministry of Food campaign may have officially concluded, but its impact continues to be felt.
