- **Amy Farrah Fowler:** Sheldon's girlfriend and later wife. She is a neurobiologist who matches Sheldon's intellect but provides the emotional growth he desperately needs.

Understanding these dynamics helps you plan your viewing. If you want episodes focused on romance, look for Penny and Leonard arcs. If you want pure science and absurdity, seek out Sheldon-centric stories.

FINDING THE BIG BANG THEORY ON MODERN PLATFORMS
