

Hunt For The Skinwalker

For decades, a remote 512-acre property in northeastern Utah has been the epicenter of one of the most bizarre and compelling paranormal mysteries in American history. WHAT IS A SKINWALKER? UNDERSTANDING THE NAVAJO LEGEND

In Navajo culture, a "skinwalker" (or yee *naaldlooshii*) is a malevolent witch or medicine person who has gained the power to shape-shift into an animal. This is not a benign transformation; skinwalkers are traditionally associated with death, curses, and great evil. According to Navajo tradition, these beings wear the skins of animals like wolves, coyotes, bears, or birds to assume their forms. They are said to possess superhuman speed, strength, and psychic abilities, and are often blamed for unexplained deaths, illnesses, and misfortunes within the community.

While the legend is deeply rooted in Navajo spirituality and is not something to be discussed lightly among the Diné, the term "skinwalker" has entered the broader paranormal lexicon. At the ranch in Utah, the term is used loosely to describe a wide range of aggressive, shape-shifting, or animalistic entities reported by witnesses. This conflation of a specific cultural legend with a broader paranormal phenomenon is a point of contention, but it has stuck. For those engaged in the **Hunt For The Skinwalker**, the creature is often just one piece of a larger puzzle involving unexplained lights in the sky and invisible forces that seem to interact with humans.

THE HISTORY OF THE RANCH: FROM THE UTE TRIBE TO THE SHERMAN FAMILY

The land now known as Skinwalker Ranch has long been considered sacred or cursed. It sits on the fringes of the Uintah and Ouray Indian Reservation, and the Ute people have their own rich oral history of the area, speaking of strange lights, phantom warriors, and a general sense of "bad medicine" permeating the valley. For centuries, the land was largely avoided, especially after dark.

In the 1950s, a local rancher named Kenneth Myers owned the property. He reported frequent UFO sightings, strange noises, and the disappearance of livestock. His stories were largely dismissed as tall tales. The most famous chapter, however,

began in 1994 when Terry and Gwen Sherman purchased the ranch with their family. They were experienced ranchers, not easily spooked. However, within months of moving in, the family began experiencing a nightmare of paranormal activity.

The Sherman Family's Ordeal

The Sherman family reported a relentless barrage of strange events:

- **Cattle Mutilations:** They found their cattle dead and surgically mutilated without any signs of blood, tracks, or struggle. Eyes, ears, and reproductive organs were removed with precision that the local sheriff described as beyond the capability of any human or predator.
- **Unexplained Lights and Orbs:** The family reported seeing bright, silent orbs of light hovering over the fields. These objects seemed to move with intelligent intent, often following family members or vehicles.
- **Shadow Figures and Cryptids:** Terry Sherman and his sons reported seeing a large wolf-like creature that was impervious to bullets. They shot it multiple times at close range, only to watch it vanish into thin air. Other sightings included humanoid shadow figures lurking near the barn.
- **Poltergeist Activity:** Inside the house, doors slammed shut on their own, heavy furniture moved, and disembodied voices were heard. The family felt a persistent sense of being watched and harassed by an unseen presence.

Frustrated and terrified, the Shermans reached out for help. Their story eventually found its way to Robert Bigelow, a billionaire aerospace entrepreneur and the founder of Bigelow Aerospace. Bigelow had a secret passion: the study of UFOs and the paranormal. In 1996, he purchased the ranch from the Shermans, who were desperate to leave. This was the turning point that turned the **Hunt For The Skinwalker** from a local oddity into a classified, high-tech investigation.

THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE FOR DISCOVERY SCIENCE (NIDS) ERA

Robert Bigelow funded a team of scientists under the banner of the National Institute for Discovery Science (NIDS). This was not a group of ghost hunters with EMF meters; NIDS employed a team of highly credentialed physicists, biologists, and engineers. Their mission was to apply the scientific method to the phenomenon at Skinwalker Ranch. The investigation was conducted largely in secrecy, but over the years, details have emerged. The team installed a network of motion sensors, infrared cameras, and electromagnetic field detectors across the property.

According to declassified reports and interviews with NIDS team members like Colm Kelleher and George Knapp, the team experienced the same high-strangeness as the Shermans. They documented:

- **Anomalous Light Phenomena:** Cameras captured orbs of light that defied physics, changing color and intensity instantly.

- **Portal-Like Activity:** Team members reported seeing strange objects materialize and dematerialize. There were reports of a "wormhole" or portal appearing in the sky above the ranch.
- **Physical Effects on Humans:** Some team members reported receiving small, unexplained burns on their skin, symptoms of radiation sickness, and severe psychological distress.
- **Technological Failure:** Equipment frequently failed. Batteries died instantly, cameras malfunctioned, and vehicles broke down without explanation

Despite their best efforts, NIDS was unable to capture definitive "smoking gun" evidence that would satisfy the broader scientific community. The phenomena seemed to be intelligent and deliberately evasive. When they pointed a camera at a hotspot, the activity would stop. It was as if the phenomenon was aware of their surveillance. The NIDS project eventually wound down, but the data collected formed the basis for some of the most compelling arguments for the reality of the phenomenon.

THE CONNECTION TO AAWSAP AND THE PENTAGON

One of the most shocking revelations in the **Hunt For The Skinwalker** narrative came in 2017 when it was revealed that the Pentagon had secretly funded a UFO investigation program called the Advanced Aerospace Weapon System Applications Program (AAWSAP). The program was run by Robert Bigelow's company, Bigelow Aerospace, and the contract was administered by the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA).

The connection to Skinwalker Ranch was direct. A primary focus of AAWSAP was the study of "anomalous health effects" and "physics-defying events" reported by military personnel. However, a significant portion of the \$22 million budget was reportedly funneled into studying the phenomenon at the Utah ranch. The program hired a team of scientists and contractors to investigate the ranch 24/7. For the first time, the United States government was officially, albeit secretly, involved in the **Hunt For The Skinwalker**.

This liaison between a billionaire, a secret government program, and a paranormal hotspot fueled intense speculation. Was the government interested because the phenomenon posed a national security threat? Or was it a cover for developing advanced technology? Lue Elizondo, the former head of the Pentagon's AATIP program (often confused with AAWSAP), has publicly stated that what was learned at Skinwalker Ranch was "groundbreaking" and directly relevant to the UFO phenomenon. The implication is clear: the mystery at the ranch is not just about folklore; it touches on the very nature of reality, consciousness, and potentially advanced non-human intelligence.

THE MODERN HUNT: THE SECRET OF SKINWALKER RANCH

In 2020, the property became the subject of a popular TV series on the History Channel called *The Secret of Skinwalker Ranch*. The show, produced with the permission of the current owner (who remains anonymous), brought a new team of scientists and investigators back to the property. The show has been criticized by skeptics for sensationalism, but it has also introduced millions of viewers to the mystery and has generated new data.

The modern **Hunt For The Skinwalker** is more technologically advanced than ever. The TV team uses drones, rocket launches, gamma-ray detectors, and ground-penetrating radar. Some of the most intriguing findings from the show include:

- **High Energy Signatures:** The team detected massive bursts of gamma radiation and electromagnetic energy coming from specific locations on the property.
- **Unexplained Aerial Objects:** Drones and cameras have frequently captured orbs and craft that cannot be identified. Some have been tracked moving at speeds and angles that violate the laws of physics.
- **Earth Anomalies:** Ground-penetrating radar has revealed large, underground voids and metallic objects buried deep beneath the surface. The team has drilled into the ground and extracted core samples that show anomalous magnetic properties.

Despite the skepticism, proponents argue that the sheer volume and consistency of the reports from multiple independent witnesses (including scientists, military personnel, and law enforcement) cannot be easily dismissed. The physical effects—the burned skin, the dead cattle, the dead grass—suggest something real is happening.

THE ONGOING FASCINATION: A MODERN MYTHOS
