### ESSENTIAL TOOLS AND MATERIALS

- **Scissors** – small, sharp embroidery scissors.
- **Water-soluble pen or pencil** – for marking guidelines that wash out.

### EMBROIDERY

The running stitch is the simplest of all embroidery stitches. It is essentially a dashed line created by passing the needle in and out of the fabric at regular intervals. Follow these steps:

1. **Thread your needle** – Use an appropriate length of floss (about 18 inches) and knot one end.
2. **Bring the needle up** from the back of the fabric to the front at your starting point.
3. **Insert the needle** back down through the fabric a short distance away (about 1/8 to 1/4 inch, depending on your desired stitch length).
4. **Pull the thread** through gently, leaving a small stitch on the surface.
5. **Repeat** – Bring the needle up again at a consistent distance from the previous stitch, then down again. Continue along your marked line.

**Tips:** Keep stitches and spaces even for a neat look. The running stitch works well for outlines, borders, and gathering fabric. It is also the basis for more advanced stitches like the whipped running stitch.

### 2. THE BACKSTITCH: STRONG AND PRECISE LINES

When you need a continuous, solid line—such as for lettering or fine details—the backstitch is ideal. It creates a strong, unbroken appearance. Here is the step-by-step:

1. **Start** by bringing the needle up at point A.
2. **Take a small stitch forward** – Insert the needle at point B (about 1/8 inch ahead) and bring it back up at point C (another 1/8 inch ahead of B). You now have a stitch from A to B, and the needle is at C.
3. **Now go backward** – Insert the needle at point B again (the end of your previous stitch) and bring it up at point D (1/8 inch ahead of C). This creates a second stitch that overlaps the first.
4. **Continue** – Each new stitch ends where the previous stitch began, producing a neat, continuous line.

**Tip:** Keep stitch lengths uniform. The backstitch is also excellent for outlining shapes before filling them with other stitches.

### 3. THE STEM STITCH: ELEGANT CURVES AND VINES

The stem stitch is a classic outlining stitch with a slightly twisted appearance. It is perfect for flower stems, vines, and flowing lines. Here is how to work it step by step:

1. **Bring the needle up** at point A.
2. **Take a small forward stitch** – Insert at point B (about 1/8 inch) and bring the needle back up at point C, which is halfway between A and B.
3. **Pull the thread** through, keeping the thread to one side of the needle (either always left or always right).
4. **Repeat** – Insert at the end of the previous stitch (point B) and come up halfway between B and the next point. The thread should always lie on the same side.

**Key detail:** The “stem” effect comes from consistently holding

the working thread to the same side. This stitch works beautifully for curved lines.

## 7. THE SATIN STITCH: SMOOTH FILLS AND SOLID

### 4. THE CHAIN STITCH: LOOPS FOR TEXTURE AND FILLS

The chain stitch creates a series of connected loops that resemble a crocheted chain. It is great for outlines, borders, and filling areas when worked in rows. Learn it step by step:

1. **Bring the needle up** at point A.
2. **Form a loop** – Insert the needle back down at the same hole (A) but do not pull the thread tight. Leave a small loop on the surface.
3. **Bring the needle up** inside that loop at point B (a short distance ahead, about 1/4 inch).
4. **Pull the thread** gently to tighten the loop around the emerged needle. Do not pull too hard or the loop will disappear.
5. **Insert the needle** back at point B (inside the loop you just created) to form the next loop.
6. **Continue** – Each new loop starts inside the previous one.

**Tip:** For a decorative variation, try the twisted chain stitch or the cable chain stitch.

## 5. THE LAZY DAISY STITCH: PERFECT PETALS AND LEAVES

Also known as the detached chain stitch, the lazy daisy is essentially a single chain stitch used individually to form petals, leaves, or small decorative elements. Step by step:

1. **Bring the needle up** at point A (the center of the flower).
2. **Form a loop** – Insert the needle back down at the same point A, leaving a loop on the surface.
3. **Bring the needle up** at point B (the tip of the petal) inside the loop.
4. **Pull the thread** gently to tighten the loop around the needle, then insert the needle just outside the loop at point C to anchor it. This creates one detached petal.
5. **Repeat** for each petal, radiating from the center.

**Variation:** For a leaf shape, simply make the loop slightly longer and narrower.

## 6. THE FRENCH KNOT: TINY TEXTURED DOTS

French knots add wonderful texture—they look like tiny beads or knotted dots. They can be tricky at first, but with practice they become second nature. Follow these steps carefully:

1. **Bring the needle up** at the desired knot location.
2. **Wrap the thread** around the needle (usually 1 to 3 times, depending on the desired knot size). Hold the wraps close to the fabric surface with your thumb.
3. **Hold the wraps tight** and insert the needle back into the fabric very close to where it emerged (almost the same hole, but slightly beside it).
4. **Pull the thread** slowly and steadily while keeping the wraps taut with your thumb. The knot should slide down the needle and sit neatly on the surface.
5. **Finish** by pulling the needle through to the back. The knot will lock in place.

**Common mistake:** Pulling the thread too quickly can cause the knot to unravel or become a loose loop. Practice on scrap fabric

first.

## AREAS

The satin stitch is used to fill shapes with parallel, closely spaced stitches that create a smooth, shiny surface. It works best for small areas. Here is the step-by-step method:

1. **Outline** the shape (e.g., a leaf or petal) with a backstitch or a split stitch to define the edges and provide a boundary.
2. **Start** at one edge of the shape. Bring the needle up at point A (on the outline).
3. **Take a straight stitch** across the shape to the opposite edge, inserting at point B.
4. **Bring the needle up** again directly next to point A (touching the previous stitch) and insert next to point B.
5. **Continue** filling the shape with parallel stitches. Keep them even and close together so no fabric shows through.

**Tip:** Use a single strand of floss for a finer, more elegant effect, or multiple strands for a bolder look.

## 8. THE SPLIT STITCH: DENSE LINES AND FILLS

The split stitch creates a braided or twisted appearance and is excellent for outlines and text. It also makes a good foundation for satin stitch fills. Step by step:

1. **Bring the needle up** at point A.
2. **Take a small forward stitch** (about 1/8 inch) and insert at point B.
3. **Bring the needle up** again at point C, which is halfway between A and B, but this time split the thread of the previous stitch as you come up.
4. **Pull through** – the needle will pass through the center of the floss, creating a split.
5. **Repeat** – each new stitch splits the previous one.

**Note:** This stitch works best with an even number of strands (e.g., 2, 4, or 6) so the splitting is clean.

## 9. THE FEATHER STITCH: DECORATIVE BORDERS AND EDGES

Feather stitch is a versatile decorative stitch that resembles a series of branching V shapes. It is often used for borders, seams, or as a filler. Learn it step by step:

1. **Bring the needle up** at the top of your line.
2. **Insert it** diagonally to the right and slightly down, then bring it up directly below that insertion, making a small slanted stitch.
3. **Without pulling the thread tight**, insert the needle diagonally to the left and down, then bring it up directly below that insertion.
4. **Continue** alternating right and left, creating a zigzag of loops. Anchor each loop by taking a tiny stitch at the center point.

**Variation:** The closed feather stitch or the double feather stitch offers different looks.

## 10. THE HERRINGBONE STITCH: OPEN WEAVE AND TEXTURE

Herring
