The real-life casting process was meticulous. The children had to sing, act, and build believable sibling chemistry. They trained together for weeks, forming bonds that mirrored the film's family. Marni Nixon, known as the singing voice for many Hollywood starlets, played Sister Sophia. Nixon's clear soprano enriches the convent scenes.
