Direct Variation in a Table

Notice the key difference: in direct variation, the variables move in the same direction; in inverse variation, they move in opposite directions. As x gets larger, y gets smaller, and vice versa.

A classic real-world example is travel time and speed. If you drive a fixed distance of 120 miles, the time it takes (y) varies inversely with your speed (x). The equation is $y = 120/x$. If you drive at 60 mph, the trip takes 2 hours. If you drive at 30 mph, the trip takes 4 hours. The constant of variation is 120, the fixed distance.

SAMPLE PROBLEMS FROM A DIRECT AND INVERSE VARIATION WORKSHEET

Problem 2: Identifying Inverse Variation

Does the table below represent inverse variation? If yes, find the constant and write the equation.

x: 2, 4, 5, 10

y: 20, 10, 8, 4

Solution: Check the product $x*y$. $2*20 = 40$, $4*10 = 40$, $5*8 = 40$, $10*4 = 40$.

The product is constant at 40, so this is inverse variation. The constant is 40, and the equation is $y = 40/x$.

Problem 3: Real-World Direct Variation

The distance a car travels varies directly with the time it drives. If the car travels 180 miles in 3 hours, how far will it travel in 7 hours?

Solution: Since distance varies directly with time, $d = kt$. Use the given values: $180 = k * 3$, so $k = 60$. The equation is $d = 60t$. For $t = 7$, $d = 60 * 7 = 420$ miles.

Problem 4: Real-World Inverse Variation

The number of workers needed to complete a job varies inversely with the time to finish the job. If 6 workers can finish in 10 days, how many workers are needed to finish in 4 days?

Solution: Since workers and time vary inversely, $w * t = k$. Using $6 * 10 = 60$, so $k = 60$. The equation is $w = 60/t$. For $t = 4$, $w = 60/4 = 15$ workers.

STRATEGIES FOR SOLVING VARIATION PROBLEMS

- **Read the problem carefully:** Determine whether the situation describes direct or inverse
