

LOW FAT MEDITERRANEAN DIET

Instead of Heavy Olive Oil Dressing

Try a vinaigrette with a ratio of 1 part olive oil to 3 parts lemon juice or vinegar, plus herbs. Or use a yogurt-based dressing (plain nonfat Greek yogurt with garlic and dill).

Instead of Fatty Cuts of Lamb or Beef

Choose skinless chicken breast, turkey, or lean cuts like sirloin. Better yet, emphasize fish (e.g., cod, tilapia) or plant proteins like chickpeas.

Instead of Full-Fat Cheese

Use reduced-fat feta or ricotta, or use a small amount of strongly flavored cheese (like Parmesan) so a little goes a long way.

Instead of Nuts and Seeds as Toppings

Use toasted whole grains or roasted chickpeas for crunch. If you include nuts, reduce the serving to a tablespoon.

RECIPES TO TRY

Here is a collection of recipes that embody the low fat Mediterranean diet. Each is designed to be flavorful, satisfying, and easy to prepare.

1. Lemon-Herb Grilled Chicken with Roasted Vegetables

This dish is a staple: juicy marinated chicken paired with a colorful array of vegetables. By using a lean cut and a marinade based on citrus and herbs, you avoid heavy oils.

Ingredients:

- 4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts (about 1.5 lbs)
- Juice of 2 lemons
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- Salt and black pepper to taste
- 2 medium zucchini, sliced
- 1 red bell pepper, chopped
- 1 red onion, wedged
- 1 cup cherry tomatoes
- Nonstick cooking spray

Instructions:

1. In a bowl, combine lemon juice, garlic, oregano, thyme, salt, and pepper. Add chicken breasts and marinate for at least 30 minutes (or overnight).
2. Preheat oven to 400°F (200°C). Spread zucchini, bell pepper, onion, and tomatoes on a baking

sheet. Spray lightly with cooking spray and season with salt and pepper.

3. Place chicken on the same sheet or a separate rack. Roast for 20–25 minutes, until chicken is cooked through (165°F internal) and vegetables are tender.
4. Serve chicken alongside vegetables. Garnish with fresh parsley if desired.

This recipe provides lean protein and fiber-rich vegetables with minimal added fat.

2. Mediterranean Lentil Soup (Low Fat Version)

Lentil soup is a classic comfort food. This version uses no oil for the base and relies on vegetable broth and aromatic vegetables for depth.

Ingredients:

- 1 cup brown or green lentils, rinsed
- 1 large onion, diced
- 2 carrots, diced
- 2 celery stalks, diced
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 6 cups low-sodium vegetable broth
- 1 can (14 oz) diced tomatoes, no salt added
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 1 teaspoon smoked paprika
- ½ teaspoon turmeric
- Salt and pepper to taste
- Juice of half a lemon
- Fresh cilantro for garnish

Instructions:

1. In a large pot, sauté onion, carrots, and celery over medium heat. Instead of oil, use 2–3 tablespoons of broth to prevent sticking. Cook for 5 minutes until softened.
2. Add garlic and cook 1 minute. Stir in cumin, paprika, and turmeric.
3. Add lentils, broth, and diced tomatoes. Bring to a boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 25–30 minutes, until lentils are tender.
4. Season with salt and pepper. Stir in lemon juice just before serving. Garnish with cilantro.

This soup is naturally fat-free but packed with fiber and flavor.

3. Greek-Style Baked Cod with Tomato and Olives (Moderate Fat)

While cod is very lean, this recipe incorporates a modest amount of olives for Mediterranean flavor. Use less olives than traditional recipes and avoid adding extra oil.

Ingredients:

- 4 cod fillets (6 oz each)
- 1 can (14 oz) crushed tomatoes
- 1 small onion, finely chopped
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- ¼ cup pitted Kalamata olives, sliced
- 1 tablespoon capers (optional)
- 1 teaspoon dried oregano
- Salt and pepper
- Fresh parsley for garnish

Instructions:

1. Preheat oven to 375°F (190°C).
2. In a nonstick skillet, cook onion using a splash of water or vegetable broth until soft. Add garlic and cook 30 seconds.
3. Stir in crushed tomatoes, olives, capers, oregano, salt, and pepper. Simmer 5 minutes.
4. Place cod fillets in a baking dish. Pour tomato mixture over the fish.
5. Bake for 15–18 minutes, until fish flakes easily. Garnish with parsley.

This dish offers healthy omega-3s from cod and the briny pop of olives, with minimal added fat.

4. Chickpea and Quinoa Salad with Lemon-Dill Dressing

A bright, protein-packed salad that works as a main or side. The dressing uses a small amount of olive oil, diluted with lemon juice and herbs.

Ingredients:

- 1 can chickpeas (15 oz), drained and rinsed
- 1 cup cooked quinoa (cooled)
- 1 cucumber, diced
- 1 red bell pepper, diced
- ¼ cup red onion, finely chopped
- 2 tablespoons fresh dill, chopped
- For the dressing: 1 tablespoon extra-virgin olive oil, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 1 teaspoon Dijon mustard, salt, pepper

Instructions:

1. In a large bowl, combine chickpeas, quinoa, cucumber, bell pepper, onion, and dill.
2. Whisk together dressing ingredients. Pour over salad and toss gently.
3. Chill for 20 minutes before serving to let flavors meld.

This salad is rich in fiber and protein, with just a hint of heart-healthy oil.

TIPS FOR COOKING LOW FAT MEDITERRANEAN MEALS

To make the transition to low fat Mediterranean cooking seamless, keep these strategies in mind:

- **Use nonstick cookware** – It allows you to sauté with minimal or no oil.
- **Bake, broil, or steam** instead of frying. This preserves moisture without added fat.

- **Roast vegetables with herbs** – Use a light mist of cooking spray rather than a generous drizzle of oil.
- **Choose low sodium** – Canned goods and broths often contain salt; no-salt-added versions give you control.
- **Incorporate Greek yogurt** – It makes creamy sauces and dips with far less fat than sour cream or mayonnaise.

BALANCING NUTRIENTS: THE ROLE OF HEALTHY FATS

A low fat Mediterranean diet does not mean eliminating all fat. In fact, you should still include small amounts of unsaturated fats from sources like olive

oil, avocados, and nuts, because they support vitamin absorption and heart health. The goal is moderation. For instance, use a teaspoon of olive oil per person in a salad dressing rather than a tablespoon. This approach keeps total fat lower while preserving the health benefits and mouthfeel.
