Simulator Sessions: Practicing Without Risk

1. **Engine failure during takeoff:** Practicing the critical decision to abort or continue after an engine failure at low altitude.

3. **Systems failures:** Dealing with alternator failures, fuel pump failures, and other system

malfunctions that require prompt corrective action.

4. **Instrument approaches:** Flying precision and non-precision instrument approaches in both normal and emergency configurations.

Simulator sessions are often scheduled before and after actual flight lessons, creating a seamless learning loop. You practice in the simulator, apply your skills in the aircraft, and then debrief to reinforce what you have learned. Flight Training: Putting Theory into Practice

The flight training phase is where everything comes together. You will fly with an instructor who is experienced in multi-engine operations and committed to your success. The flight curriculum is divided into several stages:

- **Stage 1: Familiarization and Maneuvers:** You will learn the basic handling

characteristics of the aircraft, including normal and crosswind takeoffs and landings, climbs, descents, and turns. You will also practice stalls, steep turns, and slow flight in the multi-engine configuration.

- **Stage 2: Emergency Procedures:** This stage focuses on engine failure recognition and response. You will practice engine failures during takeoff, in flight, and during landing. You will also learn to feather the propeller, secure the failed engine, and perform single-engine approaches and landings.

- **Stage 3: Advanced Operations:** You will fly cross-country missions, practice instrument procedures, and refine your crew resource management skills. This stage prepares you for the practical test (checkride) and for real-world multi-engine operations.

Throughout the flight training phase, your instructor will emphasize the importance of checklist usage, briefings, and disciplined decision-making. These habits are essential for safe multi-engine flying and are highly valued by employers in the aviation industry.

PREPARING FOR THE MULTI ENGINE CHECKRIDE

The culmination of your multi-engine training at Embry-Riddle is the practical test, commonly known as the checkride. This FAA-required test consists of an oral examination and a flight portion. The examiner will evaluate your knowledge, skills, and decision-making abilities. This Embry Riddle Multi Engine Guide includes tips to help you prepare effectively.

Oral

Examination: Know Your Systems Cold

The oral portion of the checkride typically lasts one to two hours. The examiner will ask questions about:

- Aircraft systems and limitations.
- Aerodynamics of multi-engine flight, including the effects of an engine failure.
- Performance calculations for normal and single-engine operations.

- Emergency procedures and your decision-making process.
- Federal Aviation Regulations relevant to multi-engine operations.

To prepare, study the Pilot's Operating Handbook (POH) for your aircraft thoroughly. Know the V-speeds, the emergency checklists, and the system descriptions. Practice explaining concepts out loud as if you were teaching them to someone else. This will help you articulate your knowledge clearly during the oral exam.

Flight Portion: Demonstrate Precision and Judgment

The flight portion of the checkride typically lasts one to two hours. The examiner will expect you to demonstrate:

- Proficient aircraft control during normal and emergency maneuvers.
- Proper use of checklists and procedures.
- Effective crew resource

management, including communication and task prioritization.

- Sound judgment in decision-making, especially during simulated emergencies.

One of the most challenging maneuvers on the checkride is the engine failure during takeoff. You must quickly decide whether to abort or continue, and then execute the appropriate procedure with precision. Practice this maneuver in the simulator and in the aircraft until it becomes second nature. The examiner wants to see that you can handle unexpected situations calmly and effectively.

OVERCOMING COMMON CHALLENGES IN MULTI ENGINE TRAINING

Workload

Management

The biggest difference between single-engine and multi-engine flying is the workload. With two engines come two of everything: two fuel selectors, two mixture controls, two alternators, and two sets of engine instruments. Managing all of these while flying the aircraft and communicating with air traffic control can be overwhelming at first.

Solution: Develop a systematic approach to cockpit management. Use the "aviate, navigate, communicate" priority system. Always fly the aircraft first, then deal with systems and

communication. Practice your flows and checklists until they become automatic. Over time, the workload will feel manageable.

Engine Failure Scenarios

Engine failures in multi-engine aircraft are more complex than in single-engine aircraft. You must identify the failed engine, secure it, and then fly the aircraft using only the remaining engine. The asymmetrical thrust creates control challenges, especially during takeoff and landing.

Solution: Memorize the engine

failure procedures for each phase of flight. Practice in the simulator until your responses are instinctive. Focus on maintaining control of the aircraft first, then run the appropriate checklist. Remember: the key to surviving an engine failure is to fly the aircraft all the way to the ground.

Single-Engine Handling

Flying a multi-engine aircraft on one engine requires skill and precision. The aircraft will want to yaw and roll toward the failed engine, and you must use rudder and aileron to maintain

coordinated flight. Single-engine approaches and go-arounds are particularly demanding.

Solution: Practice single-engine flight in the simulator and in the aircraft. Pay attention to trim and power management. During single-engine approaches, keep your speed up and be prepared for a go-around if necessary. Your instructor will help you develop the skills needed to handle these situations confidently.
