Solution: Factor numerator: $2(x+2)$. No cancellation, so no hole. Vertical asymptote: $x = 1$. Horizontal asymptote: degrees equal (both degree 1), ratio of leading coefficients = $2/1 = 2$, so $y = 2$. x-intercept: numerator = $0 \rightarrow x = -2$. y-intercept: set $x=0 \rightarrow f(0)=4/(-1) = -4$. Plot points and sketch the two branches approaching the asymptotes.
