

# Tales From The Crypt Episode Guide

For fans of horror, dark comedy, and twisted morality tales, few series have left as indelible a mark as **Tales from the Crypt**. Originally adapted from the 1950s EC Comics line, this HBO anthology series ran from 1989 to 1996, delivering seven seasons of ghastly delights. Each episode was introduced by the wisecracking, pun-loving Crypt Keeper, a puppet who set the tone for the grim yet playful stories that followed. ## The Origins of the Crypt: From Comics to Cable

Before HBO's *Tales from the Crypt* became a cultural phenomenon, the source material had already terrified readers. EC Comics, such as *The Vault of Horror* and *The Haunt of Fear*, were notorious in the 1950s for their graphic violence and twist endings. Decades later, producers Richard Donner, Robert Zemeckis, and Walter Hill revived the concept for the small screen, with the added freedom of cable television. The result was a series that could push boundaries—blood, nudity, and dark humor were all fair game. Each episode typically featured a cast of established stars and up-and-coming actors, from Brad Pitt to Tim Curry, often in roles that subverted their usual characters.

## Season 1 (1989): The Pilot and the First Five Tales

The first season is notably short, consisting of only five episodes plus a pilot film that originally aired in 1989. However, it established the template for everything that followed. The Crypt Keeper's first appearance set the bar high with puns like "We now return to our feature presentation, already in progress."

- **Episode 1: "The Man Who Was Death"** – Directed by Walter Hill, this stars Bill Sadler as an executioner who takes justice into his own hands after being fired. It's a grim, noir-ish tale with a killer twist.
- **Episode 2: "And All Through the House"** – A Christmas horror classic! A woman kills her husband only to be hunted by a deranged Santa Claus. It's brief, brutal, and unforgettable.
- **Episode 3: "Dig That Cat... He's Real Gone"** – A homeless man undergoes experimental surgery to become immortal, with grim consequences. Features a memorable performance by Joe Pantoliano.
- **Episode 4: "Only Sin Deep"** – A prostitute sells her looks for money, but the buyer (a creepy Leigh McCloskey) gets more than he bargained for.

- **Episode 5: "Lover Come Hack to Me"** – A newlywed couple on a remote island has a deadly secret. Chilling and atmospheric.

This short season was a proof-of-concept that worked perfectly. Critics and audiences embraced the combination of EC Comics style and HBO's lack of censorship.

## Season 2 (1990–1991): The Vault Expands

Season 2 doubled the episode count to 18, and the series truly found its stride. The Crypt Keeper became more animated (literally—the puppetry improved), and the guest stars grew more impressive. Directors like Robert Zemeckis ("The Ventriloquist's Dummy") and Tom Hanks ("None But the Lonely Heart") took their turns behind the camera.

1. **"The Ventriloquist's Dummy"** – Don Rickles voices a nasty dummy that takes over its owner's life. A fan favorite with a perfect balance of horror and humor.
2. **"The Secret"** – A woman discovers a twin sister she never knew existed, leading to a shocking finale.
3. **"Korman's Kalamity"** – A comic book artist's creations come to life, in a meta episode written by Garry Shandling.
4. **"Mute Witness to Murder"** – A mute woman (Patricia Clarkson) witnesses a murder and must fight to prove it. Tense and claustrophobic.
5. **"Television Terror"** – Morton Downey Jr. plays a sleazy investigative reporter trapped in a haunted house. The shaky-cam style was ahead of its time.

The season also featured the now-iconic wraparound segments where the Crypt Keeper hosted from his decaying mansion, often interacting with other monsters.

## Season 3 (1991–1992): Horror and Heart

With 14 episodes, season 3 is regarded by many as the peak of the series. The stories became more nuanced, often mixing genuine emotional stakes with the usual blood and puns. Key episodes include:

- **"Abra Cadaver"** – A medical student discovers a way to bring the dead back to life, but the consequences are horrific. Starring Beau Bridges.
- **"Top Billing"** – Jon Lovitz plays a struggling actor who kills his rival, only to have his victim's corpse keep showing up. Darkly comedic.
- **"Easel Kill Ya"** – A starving artist (Tim Curry) sells his soul for success, but his paintings have a life of their own. This episode is a visual feast.
- **"Creep Course"** – An aging professor (Jeffrey Jones) uses a serum to steal the youth of his students. It's a familiar premise but executed with flair.
- **"Carrion Death"** – Two escaped convicts are stranded in the desert, and one becomes the other's food. Based on a

classic EC story.

The Crypt Keeper also introduced a new level of meta-humor, breaking the fourth wall to comment on the episodes themselves. This self-awareness became a hallmark of the series.

## Season 4 (1992–1993): The Half-Hour Standard

Season 4 consisted of 13 episodes, and by this point the formula was well-established: a single, self-contained story per episode, often with a twist ending. Highlights include:

- **“None But the Lonely Heart”** – Directed by Tom Hanks (his directorial debut), this tale features a woman who falls in love with a reanimated corpse. Surprisingly tender.
- **“What’s Cookin’”** – A cannibalistic family runs a diner. Features a young Christopher Reeve in a comedic role.
- **“The New Arrival”** – A mother (Lara Flynn Boyle) becomes suspicious of her newborn’s strange behavior. A chilling take on postpartum paranoia.
- **“On a Dead Man’s Chest”** – A rock star (Paulina Porizkova) makes a pact with the devil for fame. Good music in this one.

This season also saw an increase in special effects budgets, leading to more elaborate gore and creature designs. The Crypt Keeper’s puns grew even more groan-worthy, which only added to the charm.

## Season 5 (1993–1994): The Show Hits Its Stride

With 13 episodes, season 5 continued the trend of strong writing and star power. Some of the most memorable installments appeared here:

- **“People Who Live in Brass Hearses”** – Two bumbling thieves (Bill Sadler again, and Kathy Bates) try to steal a fortune but run afoul of a cannibalistic lunatic. It’s a comedic gem.
- **“Two for the Show”** – A jealous husband creates a voodoo doll of his wife’s lover. Classic revenge horror.
- **“Well Cooked Hams”** – A magician and a ventriloquist’s dummy (again!) have a twisted relationship. The dummy’s voice actor was Billy West.
- **“Death of Some Salesmen”** – A door-to-door salesman (Ed Begley Jr.) stumbles into a family of homicidal hillbillies. A spin on the classic “country folk” trope.
- **“As Ye Sow”** – A farmer (John Stamos) plots to kill his wife, but his plan backfires spectacularly. An excellent moral lesson.

The series had become a staple of HBO’s lineup, including a tie-in with the launch of *HBO Family* and a short-lived animated series for kids (which was heavily sanitized).

## Season 6 (1994–1995): Consistency and Surprises

Season 6 contained 15 episodes, and while some felt the series was beginning to repeat itself, there were still standout moments:

- **“Only Skin Deep”** – A woman with a facial disfigurement finds love with a mysterious man. A poignant story with a fantastic twist.
- **“Beauty Rest”** – An aging beauty queen (Mädchen Amick) uses a dangerous cream to stay young. Grim body horror.
- **“Horror in the Night”** – A detective investigates a series of murders that may be connected to a supernatural presence. Nice noir atmosphere.
- **“The Pit”** – Two brothers discover a pit full of monsters in their basement. Stephen King-esque.
- **“Strung Along”** – A puppeteer (Martin Donovan) creates a marionette that closely resembles his missing wife. Dark and emotional.

The Crypt Keeper also began appearing in interstitials that referenced current pop culture, keeping the show feeling timely.

## Season 7 (1995–1996): The Final Vault

The seventh season, with 13 episodes, marked the end of the series. Ratings had declined as HBO shifted focus to other original programming, but the show went out on a high note with several memorable tales:

- **“Fatal Caper Part 1 & 2”** – A two-part finale starring an ensemble cast. It’s a comedic caper gone wrong, with a classic EC-style punchline.
- **“Surprise Party”** – A woman’s birthday party turns deadly when her ex-husband shows up with a strange gift.
- **“The Kidnapper”** – A crime boss’s son is kidnapped, but the perpetrators get more than they expected.
- **“Cold War”** – A Cold War spy story with a supernatural twist. Cynical and darkly funny.

The series finale, “The Third Pig,” was a bizarre animated episode featuring the Three Little Pigs in a horror version of the fairy tale. It was a fittingly odd and humorous conclusion.

## Beyond the Series: Legacy and Spin-offs

The **Tales From The Crypt Episode Guide** wouldn’t be complete without mentioning its enduring impact. The show spawned three feature films: *Demon Knight* (1995), *Bordello of Blood* (1996), and the direct-to-video *Ritual* (2002). It also led to the animated series *Tales from the Cryptkeeper* (1993–1995) and a short-lived radio drama. The Crypt Keeper himself became a pop culture icon, referenced in shows like *The Simpsons* and *Family Guy*.

In 2021, it was announced that a new *Tales from the Crypt* reboot was in development for TBS (later abandoned), but the rights issues have kept the original series locked away from streaming for years. However, fan demand remains high, and the existing DVD and digital releases are treasured by collectors.
