STEP 4: COMBINE AND SIMPLIFY

Now add: $\frac{2}{(x-1)(x+1)} + \frac{3(x-1)}{(x-1)(x+1)} = \frac{2 + 3x - 3}{(x-1)(x+1)} = \frac{3x - 1}{(x-1)(x+1)}$. Check if the numerator can be factored further (it cannot).
