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## THE ESSENTIAL CHORDS YOU NEED TO KNOW

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Before diving into the song structure, let's first familiarize ourselves with the primary chords that appear in “American

Honey.” The song is played in the key of A major, which is a friendly key for guitarists because it uses open chords that ring beautifully. You will only need four chords to play the entire song: **A, D, E, and F#m**. The F#m (F sharp minor) is the only barre chord in the set, but if you are not comfortable with barre shapes, there is an easy alternative using an open position.

- **A major (A)** - 002220 (or x02220)
- **D major (D)** - xx0232
- **E major (E)** - 022100
- **F#m (F sharp minor)** - 244222 (barre) or simplified as 202220 (using the Am shape barred at the 2nd fret)

If the barre F#m feels too challenging, you can substitute a **D/F#** (xx4232) or

simply play a regular F#m fingerpicking pattern. Many beginners find it easier to use a capo on the second fret and play G, C, D, and Em shapes – but that changes the key to G. For authenticity, stick with A major.

## Why These Chords Work So Well

The progression in “American Honey” follows a classic I-V-vi-IV pattern (A-E-F#m-D) that has powered countless hits across genres. This sequence creates a sense of longing and resolution that mirrors the song’s theme

of youthful love fading with time. The movement from A (tonic) to E (dominant) builds tension, which is then released into the F#m (relative minor), giving the melody a bittersweet quality. Finally, the D (subdominant) adds a warm, open feeling before returning to A. Understanding this emotional arc will help you phrase your strumming and dynamics more expressively.

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### VERSE CHORD PROGRESSION

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The verses of “American Honey” are where the story unfolds, with singer Hillary Scott’s tender vocals leading the way. The chord progression is repetitive and easy to follow:

1. **Verse 1 pattern:** A – E – F#m – D  
– A – E – F#m – D

Each chord gets two beats (one measure in 4/4 time) except the final A, which is held for four beats at the end of the eight-measure phrase. Here is a bar-by-bar breakdown:

- Measure 1: A (2 beats) – E (2 beats)
- Measure 2: F#m (2 beats) – D (2 beats)
- Measure 3: A (2 beats) – E (2 beats)
- Measure 4: F#m (1 beat) – D (1 beat) – A (2 beats)

The same progression repeats for verse 2. The simplicity allows the lyrics to shine, so focus on keeping a steady rhythm rather than complex picking.

## **CHORUS CHORD PROGRESSION**

The chorus lifts the energy with a slight variation that emphasizes the title phrase “American Honey.” The chords remain the same but the order shifts slightly to build anticipation:

1. **Chorus pattern:** A – E – F#m – D (repeat twice, then a final A – E – F#m – D leading into the next verse)

For the first two lines of the chorus, you will play the same sequence as the verse. On the third line (“She was as sweet as a honeycomb...”), the progression stays the same, but the rhythm changes to a more pronounced strum. Many players add a slight pause on the D chord before returning to A,

which mimics the pause in the melody.

## Bridge and Instrumental Sections

The bridge of “American Honey” introduces a brief departure from the main progression. It uses only two chords: **D** and **A**, alternated in a call-and-response pattern. For example:

- D (2 beats) – A (2 beats) – D (2 beats) – A (2 beats) – then back to the chorus.

The instrumental section (often a mandolin or pedal steel solo) follows the

verse-chorus progression, so you can simply repeat the pattern you already know. If you are playing solo acoustic, you can improvise a simple lead line using the A major pentatonic scale (A, B, C#, E, F#) over these chords.

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### STRUMMING PATTERNS AND DYNAMICS

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A song like “American Honey” relies as much on feel as on the chords themselves. The original recording uses a laid-back, slightly swinging rhythm with a mix of downstrokes and upstrokes. Here is a suggested pattern for a beginner-intermediate player:

- **Verse:** Down, down-up, down-up (a simple pattern with a gentle accent on the downbeat).

## PLAYING WITH A CAPO

For the chorus, try the following picking pattern: bass note (root) with thumb, then pluck the treble strings with fingers.

- **Chorus:** Down-down-up-down-up (adding an extra downstroke for emphasis). Strum closer to the bridge for a brighter tone.
- **Bridge:** Use a softer, muted strum to create a contrast before the final chorus.

Dynamic variation is key. Strum lightly during the verses to let the vocals breathe, then dig in a bit more on the chorus to match the emotional swell. The final chorus can be played with full, open strums for a climactic finish.

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## ALTERNATIVE APPROACH

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If you find the F#m barre chord difficult or prefer a lighter touch, you can use a capo at the 2nd fret and play the shapes for the key of G. This is a common substitution that makes the chord transitions easier:

- Without capo: A - E - F#m - D
- With capo at 2nd fret: G - D - Em - C

The sound remains the same because the capo raises the pitch. This version uses only open chords (G, D, Em, C) and is especially popular among beginners. However, keep in mind that if you are playing along with the original recording, you will need to transpose your playing

to match, or use a capo at the 2nd fret while the recording remains in A. The **Lady Antebellum American Honey chords** are often taught this way because it lowers the barrier to entry.

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### COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

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When learning this song, players often stumble over a few specific areas:

1. **Rushing the F#m to D**

**transition:** Because F#m is a barre chord, shifting to an open D chord can cause a momentary pause. Practice transitioning slowly, keeping your fingers close to the strings. Use the edge of your index finger as a pivot.

2. **Overplaying the strum:** The

song's charm lies in its simplicity. Resist the urge to add too many percussive strums. Let the chords ring and breathe.

3. **Ignoring the dynamics:** The song builds from a quiet, introspective verse to a soaring chorus. If you play everything at the same volume, you lose the emotional journey. Practice varying your picking strength.
