When a player completes the fourth side of a 1x1 square, they put their initial inside that box and get an extra turn. The player with the most boxes at the end wins. Battleship (Pencil and Paper Version)

Pictionary (With Pencil and Paper)

Pictionary is a classic party game that requires no commercial set. One player draws an image of a chosen word or phrase (from a list of categories like “song title,” “action,” “object”). The other players try to guess what it is within a time limit. The drawer cannot use letters or numbers. You can make your own cards by cutting paper into slips and writing prompts. **Pictionary** encourages quick thinking, visual communication, and lots of laughter. It is best for groups of four or more.

Draw a Story

In **Draw a Story**, players take turns illustrating a sentence or two of a shared story. The first player draws a scene and writes one sentence explaining it. Then they fold the paper so only the sentence is visible and pass it. The next player reads the sentence, draws a picture based on it, writes a new sentence related to the picture, folds so only the new sentence is visible, and passes. Continue for several rounds. At the end, unfold everything to see how the story and drawings evolved. This is a fantastic game for writers and artists of all ages.

MATH AND NUMBER GAMES TO SHARPEN SKILLS

You do not have to be a mathematician to enjoy these number-based **games to play with pencil and paper**. They are simple enough for children but challenging for adults.

Bullseye

Bullseye is a mental arithmetic and logic game. Each player draws a 4x4 grid. One player chooses a target number (e.g., 20). Each player fills their grid with digits 1–9 (repeats allowed). Then, using the numbers in the first row, players must combine them with addition, subtraction, multiplication, or division to equal the target number. Number Scrabble (Or 10 to 1)

Write the numbers 1 through 9 on a piece of paper. Players take turns crossing out a number. The first player to have exactly three numbers that add up to 15 wins (like Tic-Tac-Toe on a magic square). Alternatively, you can play 10 to 1: write numbers 1 to 10. Players take turns crossing out a number, and the first to make a set of three numbers that sum to 10 wins. It is a sneaky way to practice addition and strategy.
