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WHAT IS THE MAZE RUNNER ABOUT: A DEEP DIVE INTO THE DYSTOPIAN MAZE

- **Teresa:** The first and only girl to ever arrive in the Glade. Her arrival triggers a massive change in the Maze. She is telepathically linked to Thomas, and she carries the final piece of the puzzle regarding **what is The Maze Runner about**—the true purpose of the Glade.

It is a brutal, Darwinian test. The ultimate answer to **what is The Maze Runner about** is that it is a filter designed to select for the strongest, most adaptable minds.

IDENTITY, AND CONTROL
