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# How To Make Lanyard Bracelets

## Choosing Your Lace: Gimp, Boondoggle, or Scoubidou

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### PREPARING YOUR LACE: THE FIRST STEP IN MAKING A

## **LANYARD BRACELET**

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Proper preparation prevents frustration later. Follow these steps carefully before you start weaving.

### Cutting and Aligning Your Strands

Measure and cut two strands of plastic lace, each approximately 36 to 40 inches long. For a tighter weave or a wider bracelet, you may need longer strands. Hold the two strands together and find the exact midpoint of both. You will begin weaving from this center point. Align the colors exactly so your pattern

### Creating the Starting Loop

Most lanyard bracelets start with a small loop that will later hold the adjustable knot or clasp. To create this, simply fold both strands in half at the midpoint. You now have four working strands: two of one color and two of another. Tie a simple overhand knot about one inch down from the fold, leaving a small loop above the knot. This loop is the foundation of your bracelet. Clip the loop

to a board or pin it to your pants to keep it taut while you work.

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## THE FOUR-STRAND ROUND BRAID: YOUR FIRST ESSENTIAL TECHNIQUE

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The round braid, also known as the box stitch or square stitch, is the most common and visually appealing pattern for beginners. It creates a sturdy, rounded, and slightly textured bracelet. Here is a step-by-step breakdown of **how to make lanyard bracelets** using this classic method.

## the "Over and Through" Logic

Think of the four strands as being in four positions: left, right, top, and bottom. You will always work with two colors, and each color will have two strands. For this explanation, let us say Color A is on the left and right, and Color B is on the top and bottom. You will create a square knot-like structure around a central core.

1. **Step 1: The First Overhand Cross.** Take the left strand (Color A) and cross it over the top strand (Color B). Then, take the right strand (Color A) and cross it over the bottom strand (Color B). You

now have a loose "X" shape.

2. **Step 2: The First Tuck.** Take the strand that is now on the top (originally the left strand) and tuck it under the right strand, then pull it up through the loop created by the right strand. This is the first part of a square knot.
3. **Step 3: The Second Tuck.** Take the strand that is now on the bottom (originally the right strand) and tuck it under the left strand, pulling it up through the loop. You have now completed one full stitch. Pull all four strands gently but firmly to tighten.
4. **Step 4: Repeat in Alternating Order.** For the next stitch, start with the strand that was originally on the left but is now on top. The

key is to always alternate which pair you start with. This creates the spiral or box-like pattern. Continue this sequence until your bracelet reaches the desired length.

This process becomes intuitive very quickly. As you practice **how to make lanyard bracelets**, your fingers will learn the rhythm. The most common mistake beginners make is pulling the strands too tight, which makes the bracelet stiff and difficult to work with. Aim for a snug, even tension.

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### **THE FLAT STITCH: AN ALTERNATIVE PATTERN FOR BEGINNERS**

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If you prefer a wider, flatter bracelet, the

flat stitch (also known as the cobra stitch or Solomon bar) is an excellent choice. It is even easier to learn than the round braid and creates a beautiful, braided appearance.

## How to Weave the Flat Stitch

1. **Setup:** Prepare your lace exactly as you did for the round braid, with the loop at the top and four working strands.
2. **First Knot:** Take the left strand and cross it over the two middle strands (the core). Then, take the right strand and cross it over the left strand. Now, bring the right

strand under the core strands and up through the loop created by the left strand. Pull tight.

3. **Second Knot:** Now repeat the same process but in reverse. Take the right strand and cross it over the core strands. Then, take the left strand, cross it over the right, bring it under the core, and up through the loop. Pull tight.
4. **Continue:** Alternating these two steps creates a flat, braided pattern. This stitch is very forgiving and looks great with contrasting colors.

Many people learn **how to make lanyard bracelets** starting with the flat stitch because it is simple, quick, and produces a consistent result. It is also an

excellent stitch for adding beads, as you can simply slide a bead onto one of the outer strands before making the next knot.

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### **ADDING BEADS AND CHARMS: ELEVATING YOUR LANYARD BRACELETS**

onto the two strands that are about to cross each other. For the flat stitch, you can thread a bead onto one of the outer strands before tucking it under the core. This creates a lovely, spaced-out pattern. Experiment with wooden beads, glass seed beads, or even metal charms to match different outfits or occasions.

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### **FINISHING YOUR BRACELET: CLASPS, SLIDES, AND ADJUSTABLE KNOTS**

## Option 1: The Sliding Knot (Easiest and Most Common)

This method uses one piece of lace to create an adjustable knot. You will need an extra 12-inch piece of lace in a coordinating color. After you finish weaving your bracelet, tie a simple overhand knot at each end of the woven section to prevent unraveling. Then, take the extra piece of lace and tie a sliding knot around both ends of the bracelet. A sliding knot is made by wrapping the

extra lace around the two strands and tying a simple knot that can slide up and down. This allows the wearer to adjust the bracelet size easily.

## Option 2: The Button and Loop Closure

For a more elegant finish, you can incorporate a bead or button. Before you start weaving, make a larger starting loop. After weaving, thread a large bead onto the two ends and tie a knot, leaving the ends long. The bead should fit snugly through the starting loop. This creates a professional-looking clasp. You can also

 common mistake is to pull too hard on the end of the bracelet.

## Option 3: Melting the Ends (For a Permanent Fit)

If you are making a bracelet for someone with a fixed wrist size, you can simply tie the two ends together in a square knot, cut the excess lace, and use a lighter to carefully melt the cut ends. Press the melted plastic flat with the back of a metal spoon to create a smooth, sealed connection. This method is durable and waterproof.

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### TO AVOID THEM

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As you practice **how to make lanyard bracelets**, you will inevitably encounter a few hurdles. Here are the most common issues and simple solutions.

- **Uneven Tension:** This is the most frequent problem. If your bracelet is wavy or distorted, you are pulling some strands tighter than others. Focus on pulling each knot with the same amount of force. Relax your grip and let the lace flow naturally.
- **Twisted Lace:** Plastic lace can twist as you work. Periodically let the strands hang loose and untwist them. A twisted strand will create a lumpy appearance.

- **Running Out of Lace:** It is better to cut too much lace than too little. If you run out of one color, you can carefully splice in a new strand by melting the ends together, but it is easier to start with ample length.
- **Confusing the Pattern:** If you lose track of which strand to use next, simply look at the shape. In the round braid, the pattern looks like a plus sign (+) when you are about to start the next stitch.

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## CREATIVE VARIATIONS AND PROJECT IDEAS

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Once you are comfortable with the basics, you can explore countless variations. The question is no longer **how to make lanyard bracelets**, but what kind you will make next.

- **Multi-Color Patterns:** Use three or four different colors to create stripes, checkerboards, or spirals. The round braid looks striking with alternating colors.
- **Keychains and Zipper Pulls:** The same techniques used for bracelets work perfectly for keychains. Simply create a longer loop at the start to attach to a key ring.
