MAP RIT SCORES

When you use an **NWEA MAP Math practice test** that provides an estimated RIT score, you can compare it to typical grade-level norms. For example, the 2020 NWEA norms suggest the following typical spring RIT scores:

- Grade 2:
~178-190
- Grade 3:
~190-202
- Grade 4:
~200-212
- Grade 5:
~210-220
- Grade 6:
~215-228

If a student's practice test score falls below the lower bound, that signals a need for foundational skill reinforcement. If it falls above the upper

bound, the student may be ready for enrichment or advanced content. The score is not a judgment but a starting point for targeted instruction.
