Regardless of weather conditions (though heavy rain can occasionally cause signal loss), the channel lineup is stable. For sports fans, DIRECTV's "Sunday Ticket" (now on YouTube TV) historically made it a prime choice. SPORTS: THE HEARTBEAT OF CEDAR RAPIDS TELEVISION

specific sports seasons that define the year.

College Sports Dominance

The University of Iowa Hawkeyes are a ratings juggernaut. Football Saturdays in the fall and basketball games in the winter dictate social schedules. The local affiliates (specifically KCRG and KWWL) often carry games that are not on the Big Ten Network. However, the bulk of this content is on cable or streaming. While Cedar Rapids is a college sports town, professional sports still have a strong following. The Chicago Cubs and Chicago White Sox are popular, thanks to the extended reach of the Cubs broadcast network (Marquee Sports Network) and local affiliate coverage. While the Iowa Cubs (AAA affiliate) are based in Des Moines, their games sometimes appear on local sports networks. For NFL fans, the Sunday afternoon games are carried by Fox and CBS, meaning a good antenna is often enough to catch the Bears, Packers, or Vikings depending on the regional broadcast. Cedar Rapids Iowa helps you track which NFL game is being shown in your market, as it can vary week to week.

LOCAL NEWS AND WEATHER: STAYING INFORMED IN THE CORRIDOR

The Big Three News Providers
