22. I have not polluted myself.
23. I have not terrorized anyone.
24. I have not trespassed.
25. I have not been angry.
26. I have not shut my ears to the words of truth.
27. I have not blasphemed.
28. I am not a man of violence.
29. I am not a stirrer up of strife.
30. I have not acted with undue haste.
31. I have not pried into matters.
32. I have not multiplied my words in speaking.
33. I have not wronged anyone.
34. I have not done any evil thing.

35. I have not worked witchcraft against the king.
36. I have never stopped the flow of water.
37. I have never raised my voice in anger.
38. I have not cursed God.
39. I have not acted with arrogance.
40. I have not stolen the bread of the gods.
41. I have not carried away the cakes of the dead.
42. I have not taken away the food of a child.
43. I have not been insolent.

A DEEPER ANALYSIS OF THE KEY

THEMES
