Sample Thematic Essay Task

Theme: Human Rights Violations

Throughout history, governments and other groups have committed violations of human rights. These violations have occurred in various regions and time periods, often with devastating consequences for the affected populations.

Task: Select two examples of human rights violations from your study of global history. For each example, identify the historical context, describe the violation that occurred, and discuss the impact of the violation on the affected group or on the international community.

When practicing this type of essay, always start by brainstorming specific historical examples. The Armenian Genocide, the Holocaust, the Cambodian Genocide under the Khmer Rouge, and the atrocities in Rwanda are all strong possibilities. Choose two that you know well enough to discuss in detail.

Sample DBQ Short-Answer Question

Document: A political cartoon from 1904 showing a figure representing the United States standing between Central and South America, holding a large stick.

Question: What foreign policy is being depicted in this cartoon? Explain how the cartoonist uses symbolism to convey this policy.

Explanation: The cartoon depicts the Roosevelt Corollary to the Monroe Doctrine, often summarized by the phrase "Speak softly and carry a big stick." The large stick represents American military and economic power, which President Theodore Roosevelt asserted the United States would use to intervene in Latin America to maintain stability and prevent European intervention.

Read Carefully

This advice sounds obvious, but it is worth repeating. Many students lose points not because they do not know the material but because they misread questions. Pay attention to words like *except*, *not*, *most directly*, and *best*. These words change the meaning of a question entirely. When you are practicing **Global 10 Regents practice questions**, make a habit of circling or underlining key words in the question stem.

Manage Your Time

You have three hours, which is generous but not unlimited. A good rule of thumb is to spend no more than 45 minutes on the multiple-choice section, leaving the remaining time for the essays.
