
How To Keep Flies Off Dogs

This citrus spray can be applied to your dog's fur (again, avoiding sensitive areas) and also used to wipe down your dog's bedding, collar, and favorite lounging spots. The fresh scent is pleasant for humans but acts as a powerful deterrent for flies. For best results, prepare a fresh batch every few days to maintain potency.

Essential Oils with

Certain essential oils have demonstrated fly-repelling properties. However, it is crucial to use them with extreme caution, as some essential oils are toxic to dogs, especially in concentrated forms. Safe options when properly diluted include lavender, peppermint, eucalyptus, and citronella. Always mix a few drops with a carrier oil such as coconut oil or almond oil before applying to your dog's fur—never apply undiluted essential oils directly to your pet. A ratio of roughly 3 to 5 drops of essential oil per tablespoon of carrier oil is generally considered safe for adult dogs, but you

should consult your veterinarian before introducing any essential oil regimen. Never use tea tree oil, which is highly toxic to dogs.

Coconut Oil Application

Coconut oil serves a dual purpose: it is beneficial for your dog's skin and coat while also acting as a mild fly repellent. The medium-chain fatty acids in coconut oil create a thin barrier on the fur that flies find unappealing. Simply warm a small amount of organic, virgin coconut oil between your palms and

massage it into your dog's coat, paying special attention to areas where flies tend to land, such as the ears, back, and tail. This method also helps soothe dry, irritated skin and gives your dog a healthy shine.
