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# Size and Appearance

The great horned owl is a large and powerful bird. Adults typically weigh between 2 and 5.5 pounds, with females being significantly larger than males—a common trait among birds of prey. Their wingspan can stretch from 3.3 to 4.8 feet, allowing for silent, buoyant flight. The plumage is a mottled mix of browns, grays, blacks, and whites, providing exceptional camouflage against tree bark. The most distinguishing feature is the set of prominent

feather tufts on their head, which resemble horns or ears. These tufts are not related to hearing; instead, they are thought to play a role in visual communication, helping the owl express aggression or appear larger to rivals or predators.

# Exceptional Senses

The primary feathers of an owl have a soft, fringed edge that breaks up turbulence and muffles the sound of flight. This silent approach allows the owl to get within striking distance without alerting its quarry. The kill is

delivered with powerful talons that exert tremendous crushing pressure, often severing the spine of the prey. Prey is typically swallowed whole or in large pieces, and indigestible parts (fur, bones, teeth) are later regurgitated as a compact pellet.

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### **BEHAVIOR AND REPRODUCTION: LIFE CYCLE OF THE HORNED OWL**

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## Breeding Season

Breeding season begins very early in the year, often in late January or February, even in regions where snow is still on the ground. This early start gives the young a long summer to grow and

learn to hunt before their first winter. The male performs courtship displays, calling to the female and offering food. Pairs are monogamous and often mate for life, using the same nesting territory year after year.

## Nesting and Develop ment

The female lays a clutch of 1 to 4 eggs, which she incubates for about 30 to 37 days. During this period, the male provides all the food for the female. The eggs hatch asynchronously, meaning the oldest chick may be several

days larger than the youngest. This can be a brutal survival strategy; if food is scarce, the smallest chick may not survive. The young, called owlets, are covered in soft down and are helpless at birth. They leave the nest (fledge) at about 6 to 8 weeks but remain dependent on their parents for food for several more months as they perfect their hunting skills.

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### **VOCALIZATIONS: THE VOICE OF THE WILD**

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The iconic call of the great horned owl is a series of five to eight deep, resonant hoots: "*Who's awake? Me too!*" or "*Hoo-h'HOOO-HOOO-hoo.*" This call is used primarily for territorial defense and to attract a mate. Both males and females call,

though the female's voice is higher in pitch. Beyond the classic hoot, they produce a variety of other sounds, including shrill whistles, barks, and a loud, screeching hiss used when threatened.
