general truths about the past. It is one of the most frequently used tenses in English, making it essential for daily conversation.

For example:

- I **walked** to the store yesterday.
- She **played** the piano when she was a child.
- They **visited** their grandparents last weekend.

The key feature of the simple past tense is its formation. For regular verbs, we simply add the suffix **-ed** to the base form. THE GOLDEN RULE: HOW TO FORM THE SIMPLE PAST OF REGULAR VERBS

Basic Rule: Add -

ed

For most regular verbs, simply add **-ed** to the base form.

- talk → talked
- play → played
- clean → cleaned
- listen → listened

Verbs Ending in -e: Add -d Only

If the base form already ends in the letter **-e**, you only add **-d**.

- like → liked
- love → loved
- save → saved
- dance → danced

Verbs Ending in Consonant + -y: Change -y to -ied

When a verb ends in a consonant followed by **-y**, change the **-y** to **-i** and add **-ed**.

- study → studied
- try → tried
- carry → carried
- hurry → hurried

Exception: If the verb ends in a vowel + **-y**, just add **-ed** (e.g., play → played, enjoy → enjoyed).

Consonant:

Double the Final Consonant

For one-syllable verbs that end in a single consonant, preceded by a single vowel, double the final consonant before adding **-ed**. This is known as the CVC pattern.

- stop → stopped
- plan → planned
- rob → robbed
- drop → dropped

For verbs with more than one syllable, we usually double the final consonant only if the stress is on the last syllable.

- prefer → preferred (stress on second syllable)
- travel → traveled (UK) or travelled (US) – this varies!

PRONUNCIATION OF REGULAR PAST TENSE -ED ENDINGS

Knowing the **simple past tense regular verbs list** is one thing; pronouncing the forms correctly is another. The **-ed** ending can be pronounced in three different ways: **/t/**, **/d/**, or **/ɪd/**. The pronunciation depends on the final sound of the base verb, not the spelling.

Pronunciation

Rule 1: /t/ Sound

If the base verb ends in an unvoiced sound (like p, k, f, s, sh, ch, th), the **-ed** is pronounced as **/t/**.

- walked /wɔːkt/
- helped /helpt/
- laughed /læft/
- missed /mɪst/
- watched /wɒtʃt/

Pronunciation

Rule 2: /d/ Sound

If the base verb ends in a voiced sound (like b, g, l, m, n, v, z, all vowels), the **-ed** is pronounced as **/d/**.

- lived /lɪvd/
- played /pleɪd/
- opened /'əʊpənd/
- called /kɔːld/
- loved /lʌvd/

Pronunciation

Rule 3: /ɪd/ Sound

Sound

If the base verb ends in a **/t/** or **/d/** sound, the **-ed** is pronounced as **/ɪd/**. This adds an extra syllable to the word.

- started /'stɑːtɪd/
- needed /'niːdɪd/
- wanted /'wɒntɪd/
- decided /dɪ'saɪdɪd/
- visited /'vɪzɪtɪd/

Mastering this pronunciation pattern will make you sound more natural and fluent when using the simple past tense regular verbs list in conversation.
