CLASSROOM AND HOME FAVORITES: BOARD AND CARD GAMES

Multiplication War (Card Game)

This is a fantastic twist on the classic card game "War." Here is how it works:

1. Remove the face cards from a standard deck of playing cards (or assign them a value like 10 or 11). Aces can be worth 1.
2. Deal the entire deck evenly between two players, face down.
3. At the same time, both players flip over their top two cards.

Multiplication Bingo

Bingo is a classic game that never gets old. To play multiplication Bingo, create Bingo cards filled with products (e.g., 12, 18, 24, 30, etc.). Instead of calling out numbers, the caller reads a multiplication fact, such as "3 x 4." Players must then find the product "12" on their card and mark it. The first player to get five in a row wins. This is one of the most adaptable **math multiplication games for 4th grade** because you can easily change the facts to focus on specific times tables.

Roll and Multiply (Dice Game)

All you need for this game are two dice and a piece of paper for each player.

- Players take turns rolling two dice.
- They multiply the two numbers shown on the dice.
- They write the multiplication fact and the product on their paper.
- After a set number of rounds (e.g., 10), players add up all their products.
- The player with the highest total score wins.

To make it more challenging, you can use 10-sided or 12-sided dice to introduce larger numbers.

ACTIVE LEARNING: MOVEMENT-BASED MULTIPLICATION GAMES
