PRACTICAL TIPS FOR LEARNING THE PIECE

The sheet music will indicate **crescendos** and **diminuendos**. The sustain pedal is your best friend, but it can also be your enemy. Use half-pedaling to add resonance without muddying the harmony. The song breathes. Let it breathe. Let the silence between the chords speak as loudly as the notes themselves.

CHALLENGES AND HOW TO OVERCOME THEM

Every pianist hits a wall when learning this song. Here are the most common obstacles and practical solutions.

The Wide Stretch in the Left Hand

Bowie's bass lines often span intervals larger than an octave. If you have small hands, do not try to hit every note. Use a rolled chord (arpeggiate the bass note quickly from bottom to top) or drop the middle note of the

chord. It is better to play cleanly with a simplification than to miss notes and break the rhythm.

The Unconventional Rhythmic Feel

The song is not strictly metronomic. It has a “rubato” feel in the verses. Do not be afraid to push and pull the tempo slightly. Listen to the original recording. Bowie’s voice comes in slightly behind the beat in some phrases. Try to mimic that human feel rather than playing like a robot. The sheet music gives you the

The Bridge Modulation

The bridge (“Is there life on Mars?”) involves a key change that can be disorienting. Practice this section very slowly. Mark the accidentals (sharps and flats that are not in the key signature) in red pencil. Your brain needs time to process the new harmonic center.
