- **Boom Operator** – Holds the microphone boom to capture sound without appearing in the shot. Requires impeccable spatial awareness.
- **Visual Effects (VFX) Artist** – Creates digital imagery that integrates with live-action footage. Roles range from compositing to 3D modeling to motion tracking.
- **Colorist** – In post-production, adjusts color and lighting to achieve the desired mood and consistency across scenes.
- **Stunt Coordinator and Performer** – Choreographs and executes action sequences safely. Requires physical training and rigorous safety protocols.
- **Set Construction Crew** – Carpenters, painters, and builders who construct the physical sets according to art department plans.

Many technical roles offer union membership (e.g., IATSE) and
