

O Divine Redeemer And Notwithstanding My Weakness And A More Determined Disciple

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INTRODUCTION: THE CRY OF THE FAITHFUL HEART

The prayer “O Divine Redeemer and notwithstanding my weakness and a more determined disciple” echoes through centuries of Christian devotion. It captures the paradox of faith: a soul simultaneously aware of its own frailty and desperate for deeper commitment. This phrase—drawn from hymns and personal liturgies—speaks to anyone who has ever felt the gap between their spiritual aspirations and their daily reality. To call upon the Divine Redeemer is to acknowledge Christ as the only source of salvation. To add “notwithstanding my weakness” is to do so with raw honesty. And to yearn to be “a more determined disciple” is to stake a claim on growth, despite every failure. This article explores the profound meaning of this petition, its biblical foundations, and how believers can move from acknowledging weakness to embracing a more resolute walk with God.

UNDERSTANDING THE CRY: “O DIVINE REDEEMER”

The title “O Divine Redeemer” points directly to Jesus Christ, the one who ransoms humanity from sin and death. In Christian theology, redemption is not a metaphor but a historical act: the Son of God took on flesh, died on a cross, and rose again. To address Christ as the Divine Redeemer is to confess that no human effort can earn salvation—it is a gift received by grace. This cry is both personal and communal. It is the plea of the psalmist who says, “Redeem me, O Lord, and be merciful to me!” (Psalm 26:11). It is also the confession of the early church, which sang of “the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world.”

When a believer prays “O Divine Redeemer,” they are not merely reciting a formula. They are placing themselves under the authority of the One who alone can transform weakness into strength. This invocation sets the stage for the second part of the petition: the honest admission of human limitation.

THE REALITY OF HUMAN WEAKNESS

The phrase “notwithstanding my weakness” is not a reluctant add-on; it is the heart of honest discipleship. Scripture is filled with examples of God’s chosen people grappling with their own inadequacy. Moses claimed he was slow of speech. Jeremiah protested his youth. The apostle Paul famously pleaded three times for the removal of a “thorn in the flesh” and received the answer, “My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness” (2 Corinthians 12:9).

Weakness can take many forms: recurring sin, physical limitation, emotional fatigue, intellectual doubt, or moral failure. Peter, the rock on whom Christ said He would build His church, denied his Master three times. Yet after the resurrection, Jesus restored him and commissioned him to feed His sheep. The Gospel does not bypass weakness—it enters into it. To pray “notwithstanding my weakness” is to accept that discipleship happens not despite our flaws, but through them, as we learn to rely on divine strength.

This honest reckoning also frees us from the pressure of perfectionism. Many believers struggle with guilt over past failures, fearing they are disqualified from being used by God. But the biblical narrative consistently shows that God chooses imperfect vessels. The “Divine Redeemer” does not wait for us to become strong; He meets us in our weakness and begins the work of transformation.

EMBRACING A MORE DETERMINED DISCIPLESHIP

The final part of the prayer—“and a more determined disciple”—reveals a holy ambition. To be determined is to set one’s face like flint, as Isaiah said of the suffering servant. Determination in discipleship does not mean self-reliance; it means a steadfast orientation toward Christ, refusing to let obstacles derail the journey.

But what does a “more determined disciple” look like in daily life? It is not someone who never stumbles, but someone who gets back up. It is the parent who, exhausted after a long day, still reads Scripture with their children. It is the student who, struggling with doubt, continues to pray honestly. It is the senior adult who, facing chronic pain, still serves others. Determination is the quiet resolve that says, “I will follow Christ, even when I cannot feel His presence.”

Cultivating Dependence on Grace

The key to sustaining determination is not grit but grace. A determined disciple does not try harder in their own strength; they lean harder on the Spirit. The letter to the Hebrews encourages believers to “run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith” (Hebrews 12:1-2). Looking to Jesus shifts the focus from our own effort to His finished work. This dependence is cultivated

through regular prayer, study of the Word, and participation in the sacraments.

Moreover, grace is not a one-time gift but a daily supply. The apostle Paul wrote, “By the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain” (1 Corinthians 15:10). A determined disciple learns to draw on that grace moment by moment, especially in times of trial.

Learning from Spiritual Mentors

Another way to grow in determination is to observe those who have gone before. The “cloud of witnesses” in Hebrews 11 includes people like Abraham, who “in hope believed against hope,” and Moses, who “considered the reproach of Christ greater wealth than the treasures of Egypt.” Modern-day mentors—pastors, small group leaders, or faithful friends—can model what it means to persevere. Their stories of weakness and restoration remind us that we are not alone.

Spiritual reading also plays a role. Classics like *The Imitation of Christ* by Thomas à Kempis or *The Pilgrim’s Progress* by John Bunyan illustrate the struggles and victories of the Christian life. These resources can strengthen resolve and provide practical wisdom.

Practical Steps to Persevere

Determination is that elusive quality we all crave. Fortunately, there are practical steps that can help us become more determined disciples:

- **Set Small, Consistent Goals:** Rather than promising dramatic change, focus on daily habits: ten minutes of prayer, reading one chapter of the Bible, sharing an encouraging word with someone.
- **Create Accountability:** Share your desire to grow with a trusted friend or a small group. Regular check-ins can help you stay on track.
- **Celebrate Progress, Not Perfection:** Acknowledge each step forward, no matter how small. God honors the widow’s mite and the cup of cold water given in His name.
- **Use a Journal:** Writing down prayers, struggles, and insights can clarify your thoughts and reveal patterns of growth over time.
- **Practice Gratitude:** Thankfulness shifts the focus from what you lack to what you have received in Christ.

THE ROLE OF COMMUNITY AND PRAYER

No disciple grows in isolation. The early church “devoted themselves to the apostles’ teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers” (Acts 2:42). Community provides encouragement, correction, and support. When one member is weak, others carry the burden. When one is strong, they lift up the feeble.

Prayer, both personal and corporate, is the lifeline of determination. The prayer “O Divine Redeemer and notwithstanding my weakness and a more determined disciple” is itself a model of how to pray: honest, expectant, and surrendered. It acknowledges that the will to follow God ultimately comes from God. As Paul wrote to the Philippians, “for it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for his good pleasure” (Philippians 2:13). Our part is to show up, to open our hands, and to ask.

Intercessory Prayer for the Weak

One of the most powerful ways to grow in determination is to pray for others who are struggling. When we intercede for the weak, we are reminded of our own need and of God’s faithfulness to sustain all who call upon Him. It also expands our vision beyond our own struggles. The apostle Paul frequently requested prayer: “Brothers, pray for us” (1 Thessalonians 5:25). A determined disciple learns both to ask for prayer and to pray for others.

CONCLUSION: FROM WEAKNESS TO WITNESS

The prayer “O Divine Redeemer and notwithstanding my weakness and a more determined disciple” is more than a poetic phrase—it is a roadmap for the Christian life. It begins by fixing our eyes on Jesus, the Redeemer. It continues by telling the truth about our frailty. And it ends with a holy resolve to keep following, no matter what.

Weakness does not disqualify us; it qualifies us to receive grace. Determination does not come from trying harder alone, but from resting in the One who has already won the victory. As we embrace both our need and His sufficiency, we become witnesses to the power of redemption. The world does not need perfect disciples; it needs disciples who, aware of their weakness, press on with determination because of the Divine Redeemer who holds them fast. May that be our daily prayer—and our daily reality.
