This proactive approach prepares students for difficulties before they arise.

5. Reflection and Review Schedule

A worksheet that is filled out once and forgotten is useless. A great design includes a section for scheduling regular check-ins, such as weekly or monthly reviews. It asks questions like "What worked this week?" and "What do I need to adjust?" This instills a habit of continuous improvement.

HOW TO CREATE A SETTING GOALS FOR STUDENTS WORKSHEET

When you build this worksheet, keep the design clean and uncluttered. Use plenty of white space. A student goal setting worksheet should be inviting, not intimidating.

TIPS FOR USING THE WORKSHEET EFFECTIVELY
