YOUR FIRST STEPS: MASTERING THE FUNDAMENTALS

Learning to See Shapes

The Magic of Light and Shadow (Value)

1. **Draw a Circle:** Start lightly. Do not worry if it is not perfect. Use your HB pencil and a light touch. You can draw a square and round the corners if that helps guide you.

5. **Create the Midtones:** Using the side of your 2B pencil, gently shade the rest of the sphere except for a small area near the light source. The shading should be darkest near the core shadow and gradually fade as it moves toward the light.
6. **Blend and Smooth:** Use your finger or a tissue to gently blend the graphite. This removes the harsh pencil lines and creates a smooth gradient. Be careful not to smudge the highlight.
7. **Add the Highlight:** Use your kneaded eraser to gently lift the graphite in the small area where the light hits the sphere directly. This should be a bright, clean spot.
8. **Finish the Cast Shadow:** Darken the cast shadow so it is darker than the core shadow of the sphere. The shadow should be darkest right under the sphere and soften as it gets further away.

Congratulations. You have just drawn a three-dimensional object. This single exercise teaches you contour, value, blending, and lighting. Repeat this exercise with different light sources and different objects (cubes, cylinders, cones) to build a robust foundation.
