METHOD THREE: USING SILICA GEL TO MAINTAIN SHAPE AND COLOR

Silica gel is a granular desiccant that absorbs moisture quickly and evenly. It is arguably the best method for preserving a rose while keeping its three-dimensional shape and much of its original color. Silica gel is widely available at craft stores and online, and it can be reused many times. Steps for Silica Gel Rose Preservation

- Choose a rose that is fully open but not past its prime. Trim the stem to about two inches.
- Pour a one-inch layer of silica gel into an airtight container. A plastic or glass container with a tight lid works best.
- Place the rose upright in the silica gel, with the stem buried slightly. Then, gently pour more silica gel over the rose, working it carefully between the petals. Use a small spoon or a brush to ensure every crevice is covered.
- Seal the container and leave it for five to seven days. Do not open it during this time, as moisture from the air can interfere with the process.
- After a week, carefully pour out the silica gel and lift the rose. It should feel dry but not brittle. If it still feels soft, leave it for another day or two.
- Use a soft brush to remove any remaining silica gel powder from the petals.

Silica gel preserves the rose in a state that looks almost lifelike. The color is vibrant, and the petals retain their shape. This method is ideal for keepsake boxes, domes, or shadow boxes. It does require a bit more effort and expense than air drying, but the results are well worth it.

METHOD FOUR: GLYCERIN PRESERVATION FOR FLEXIBLE, LONG-LASTING ROSES

Glycerin preservation is a technique that replaces the water inside the rose cells with a plant-based glycerin solution. The result is a rose that remains soft and flexible, rather than brittle and dry. This method works especially well for roses that will be handled or displayed in arrangements. How to Preserve a Rose with Glycerin

- Mix one part glycerin with two parts warm water. Stir thoroughly.

Glycerin-preserved roses last for years and do not require sealing or special storage. They are more resistant to dust and damage than air-dried roses. The main trade-off is that the color will shift, often toward brown or bronze tones. Many people find this aged look beautiful and organic, but if you need bright, exact colors, silica gel is a better choice.

METHOD FIVE: EPOXY RESIN FOR A PERMANENT, GLASS-LIKE DISPLAY
