As of 2025, the internationally recognized and officially accepted height of Mount Everest is **8,848.86 meters (29,031.69 feet)**. This figure was jointly announced by Nepal and China in December 2020, replacing the long-standing measurements that had been used for decades. This new, precise measurement settled a long-running discrepancy between the two nations and provided the most accurate data on the **Everest height measurement** to date.

The 2020 Joint Survey: A Historic Collaboration

The 2020 announcement was a landmark moment in geographical science. For years, Nepal recognized a height of 8,848 meters (based on the 1954 Survey of India), while China often cited a figure of 8,844.43 meters, arguing that this measurement excluded the snow cap and only accounted for the rock height. The 2020 survey was a collaborative effort using the most advanced technology available, including **GPS, LiDAR** (Light Detection and Ranging), and ground-penetrating radar. This joint venture between Nepal and China not only resolved a diplomatic sticking point but also gave the world a definitive answer to the question, "How high is Mt Everest?"

The new height of 8,848.86 meters is 0.86 meters higher than the previous widely accepted figure. This difference is attributed to a combination of factors, including tectonic uplift, the precise measurement of the snow and ice cap, and the use of more accurate geoid models that account for the Earth's gravitational field.

A HISTORY OF MEASURING THE WORLD'S HIGHEST PEAK

The quest to answer **how high is Mt Everest** is almost as old as the fascination with the mountain itself. Before the peak was even named Everest, surveyors were trying to calculate its elevation from distant locations.

In the mid-19th century, the Great Trigonometrical Survey of India, a massive scientific undertaking, mapped the Indian subcontinent. In 1856, the survey team, led by Andrew Waugh, identified "Peak XV" as the world's tallest. Using a network of trigonometric calculations from observation points hundreds of kilometers away, they calculated its height to be 29,002 feet (8,840 meters). This was remarkably accurate for its time, though it did not account for atmospheric refraction, light bending, and other modern corrections. Interestingly, the height was initially announced as exactly 29,000 feet, but to avoid the appearance of a rounded estimate, it was officially recorded as 29,002 feet. For over a century, this was the standard answer to **how high is Mt Everest**.

The 1954 Recalculation: Setting the Standard

The next major revision came in 1954, following Nepal opening its borders to foreigners. The Survey of India conducted a more detailed measurement from 12 different stations, using a network of 79 theodolite observations. This survey concluded that Everest's elevation was 8,848 meters (29,028 feet). For decades, this became the universally accepted figure. It was a number etched into the minds of climbers, geographers, and schoolchildren worldwide, answering the question **how high is Mt Everest** for an entire generation.

WHAT ARE THE SCIENTIFIC METHODS USED FOR THE EVEREST HEIGHT MEASUREMENT?

GPS and Global Navigation Satellite Systems

In the 2020 survey, survey teams placed a GPS receiver on the summit of Everest. This receiver communicated with a network of satellites to triangulate its precise position in three-dimensional space. This method is far more accurate than traditional ground-based triangulation. Data from the Global Navigation Satellite System (GNSS) provides the latitude, longitude, and altitude to within centimeters.

LiDAR and Ground-Penetrating Radar

Another critical piece of technology used to determine **how high is Mt Everest** is LiDAR. A LiDAR scanner was flown over the summit, firing laser pulses at the ground to create a high-resolution 3D map of the terrain. Why Is There a Difference Between Snow and Rock Height?

The 2020 survey established the snow depth at the summit to be approximately 3.5 meters. This snow cap is dynamic, changing with seasonal weather, wind, and glacial movement. By including the snow cap in the official height, the measurement represents what a climber would actually stand on, offering a practical and consistent standard.

COMPARING EVEREST TO OTHER TALL MOUNTAINS

While Everest is the tallest mountain above sea level, other mountains challenge its claim to the title of "highest" depending on how you define the term. Understanding these distinctions gives a richer context to the question **how high is Mt Everest**.

The Tallest from Sea Level

Everest's height of 8,848.86 meters above sea level makes it the undisputed champion when measured from the ocean surface. Its summit is the point in the world where the Earth's surface is farthest from sea level. This is the standard by which all mountain heights are usually compared.

Mauna Kea: The Tallest from Base to Summit

If you measure a mountain from its base on the ocean floor to its summit, **Mauna Kea** in Hawaii is actually taller than Everest. Mauna Kea rises approximately 10,210 meters (33,500 feet) from its base on the Pacific Ocean floor. However, only about 4,205 meters (13,796 feet) of it is above sea level, so its prominence is not visible. This is a fascinating nuance when exploring the question **how high is Mt Everest** compared to other massive peaks.

Chimborazo: The Farthest from the Earth's Center

Another way to define "highest" is the point farthest from the Earth's center. Because the Earth is a flattened spheroid (bulging at the equator), the peak of **Chimborazo** in Ecuador is over 2,000 meters farther from the center of the Earth than Everest's summit. This makes Chimborazo the highest peak in terms of distance from the planet's core. These comparisons show that the answer to **how high is Mt Everest** depends on the metric you use.

- **Mount Everest:** 8,848.86 m above sea level (highest altitude)
- **Mauna Kea:** 10,210 m from base to summit (tallest overall)
- **Chimborazo:** 6,384 km from Earth's center (farthest point out)

NATURAL FACTORS THAT CHANGE EVEREST'S HEIGHT

The height of Everest is not static. The answer to **how high is Mt Everest** today is slightly different than it was a decade ago, and it will continue to change. Several powerful natural forces are at work.

Plate Tectonics: The Force That Created the Himalayas

The Indian tectonic plate is still slowly colliding with the Eurasian plate, and this process continues to push the Himalayan range upward. Everest's height is estimated to increase by approximately **0.25 to 0.5 centimeters every year** due to this tectonic pressure. This means the mountain is literally growing, albeit very slowly. Earthquakes: A Sudden Drop

While tectonic forces push the mountain up, powerful earthquakes can cause it to drop. Subsequent research suggested the change was smaller, but it highlighted the volatile nature of the region.
