THE TECHNICAL SIDE: HOW TOM TRYNISKI DIGITIZES AND PRESERVES

process. Tryniski uses high-resolution flatbed scanners, often at 300 to 600 dpi, to capture the finest details of each postcard. CHALLENGES AND LIMITATIONS OF THE COLLECTION

No resource is perfect, and the **Old Fulton NY Post Cards By Tom Tryniski Fulton History** archive has a few limitations. The search functionality is basic; there is no optical character recognition (OCR) for the text on the postcards. That means you cannot search for words written on the back unless they appear in the filename. Also, because the site is hosted on a private server, it can occasionally be slow or temporarily unavailable when high traffic spikes occur.

Furthermore, Tryniski organizes his postcards by location, but not

always by strict chronological order. You may need to browse manually to find postcards from a specific year. However, given the enormous volume of material (hundreds of thousands of images), these are minor
