- **E**xponents (or Orders, including powers and roots)
- **M**ultiplication and **D**ivision (from left to right)
- **A**ddition and **S**ubtraction (from left to right)

When exponents appear, they must be evaluated immediately after parentheses (or brackets) and before any multiplication, division, addition, or subtraction. For example, in the expression  $2 + 3^2 \times 4$ , you first calculate the

exponent:  $3^2 = 9$ . Then multiply:  $9 \times 4 = 36$ . Finally add:  $2 + 36 = 38$ . Skipping or misordering these steps leads to incorrect answers. **Math worksheets order of operations with exponents** drill this sequence repeatedly, turning a confusing rule into an automatic habit.

Speed comes with accuracy, not before it. Initially, allow as much time as needed to get every problem correct. Once the student consistently achieves 90% or higher, introduce a gentle time limit to build fluency.

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## Mistake 1: Ignoring Exponent

The most frequent error is treating exponents as if they were multiplication. For example, a student might compute  $2 \times 3^2$  as  $(2 \times 3)^2 = 6^2 = 36$ , which is wrong. The correct order is exponent first:  $3^2 = 9$ , then multiply:  $2 \times 9 = 18$ . Some students think that  $(3 + 2)^2$  means  $3^2 + 2^2$ , which is the **distributive property of exponents over addition** — but that property does not hold for addition!  $(3 + 2)^2 = 5^2 = 25$ , not  $9 + 4 = 13$ . ## Mistake 3: Forgetting Left-to-Right Rule for Multiplication and Division

When an expression contains both multiplication and division (or addition and subtraction), they must be performed

from left to right, not in any particular order. For example,  $8 \div 4 \times 2 = (8 \div 4) \times 2 = 2 \times 2 = 4$ , not  $8 \div (4 \times 2) = 8 \div 8 = 1$ . Worksheets that mix these operators help students internalize the directional rule.
