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## THE GENESIS OF THE FIVE FAMILIES: THE STRUCTURE OF THE TREE

the anatomy of the Mafia family tree itself. The term “family” is a misnomer in the biological sense; these were criminal enterprises built around a **hierarchical command structure** modeled after the Sicilian Mafia. At the top sat the **boss**, the undisputed leader who made all major decisions. Below him was the **underboss**, the second-in-command, and the **consigliere**, a trusted advisor who mediated disputes.

The next tier consisted of **capos** (captains), each overseeing a crew of **soldiers** (made members) who carried out the family’s illegal activities—extortion, loan sharking, gambling, labor racketeering, and,

notably during Prohibition, bootlegging. Associates, non-Italian affiliates, circled the tree's outer branches, performing tasks without being full members. This rigid structure ensured discipline and secrecy, allowing the families to operate as parallel sovereign entities under the umbrella of the **Commission**, a governing body that settled disputes and authorized major hits.

The **New York Mafia family tree** formally took root in 1931, following the Castellammarese War. After the assassination of boss Salvatore Maranzano, Lucky Luciano reorganized the underworld into five distinct families, each with its own territory and boss.

These became the Bonanno, Colombo, Gambino, Genovese, and Lucchese families—the bedrock of American organized crime for generations.

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### **BRANCH ONE: THE GAMBINO FAMILY - THE MOST POWERFUL LIMB**

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Often considered the most prominent branch of the **New York Mafia family tree**, the Gambino family dominated organized crime from the 1950s onward. Originally known as the Mangano family, it was renamed after Carlo Gambino, who seized control in 1957 and ruled for nearly two decades. Under Gambino, the family expanded into drug trafficking, airport hijackings, and infiltration of the construction industry.

His was a reign of quiet, methodical power—he avoided the spotlight, preferring bribery and diplomacy to open violence.

Key figures on the Gambino branch include **Paul Castellano**, Gambino's cousin and successor, whose lavish lifestyle and corporate-style management alienated younger members. His murder in 1985, orchestrated by John Gotti, marked a turning point. Gotti, the "Teflon Don," brought media attention but ultimately weakened the family through high-profile trials. Underboss Sammy "The Bull" Gravano's defection as a government witness delivered a crippling blow to the tree's stability. Today, the

Gambino family remains active but significantly diminished, its power shared among aging leaders and new factions.

## Notable Gambino Capos and Crews

- **John Gotti:** Boss from 1986 to 1992, known for his flamboyant style and successful acquittals until his downfall.
- **Sammy Gravano:** Underboss and later informant,

whose testimony dismantled Gotti's inner circle.

- **Roy DeMeo:**

Head of a notorious crew involved in car theft and murder, operating from the Gemini Lounge.

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## **BRANCH TWO: THE GENOVESE FAMILY - THE SILENT POWER**

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If the Gambinos were the flashy branch, the **Genovese family** was the quiet, deeply rooted trunk of the **New York Mafia family tree**. Often called the "Ivy League" of organized crime, the Genovese family has historically maintained the most discipline and the least public

exposure. It traces its lineage to Lucky Luciano, who created the modern Commission. The family took its name from Vito Genovese, a ruthless boss who ruled from prison in the 1950s and 60s.

The Genovese family's power lies in its infiltration of legitimate businesses—particularly the New York waterfront, garment district, and construction unions. Their strategy of having a "front boss" to take public scrutiny while the real boss operates behind the scenes has made them the most resilient of the Five Families. Leaders like **Vincent "Chin" Gigante** notoriously feigned mental illness to avoid prosecution, a tactic that kept the family

intact through the 1990s. Even today, the Genovese family is considered the most cohesive and secretive branch of the tree.

## Key Genovese Bosses

1. **Charles “Lucky” Luciano** – Founder and architect of modern organized crime.
2. **Vito Genovese** – Ruthless leader who consolidated power despite prison time.
3. **Vincent “Chin” Gigante** – Master of deception, ruled from 1981 to 2005.

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### **BRANCH THREE: THE LUCCHESE FAMILY - THE MID- LEVEL POWERHOUSE**

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The **Lucchese family**, originally the Gagliano family after early boss Tommy Gagliano, found its footing under Gaetano “Tommy” Lucchese in the 1950s. Lucchese forged a strong alliance with Carlo Gambino, creating a partnership that dominated the Commission. This branch of the **New York Mafia family tree** specialized in labor racketeering, controlling unions in the city’s concrete, waste management, and transportation sectors.

However, the Lucchese tree suffered a devastating break in the 1980s and 1990s.

Boss **Anthony “Gaspie” Casso** ordered the murder of rival family members and even his own underboss, but his reign ended when mob boss turned informant **Alphonse “Little Al” D’Arco** testified against him. The family’s membership shrank, but it continues to operate quietly, often focusing on white-collar crimes and traditional rackets.

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#### **BRANCH FOUR: THE BONANNO FAMILY - FROM EXILE TO REBIRTH**

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Few branches of the **New York Mafia family tree** have experienced as many upheavals as the Bonannos. Named after **Joseph Bonanno**, the family was once one of the most powerful, but it was also the most

rebellious. In the 1960s, Bonanno’s attempt to seize control of the Commission sparked the “Bananas War,” an internal conflict that led to his exile and the family’s temporary expulsion from the Commission.

The Bonanno family rebounded under leaders like **Philip Rastelli** and later **Joseph Massino**, the last boss to hold power in the era of RICO. Massino, however, broke the ancient code of omertà by becoming a government witness, leading to the conviction of dozens of members. Today, the Bonanno family is smaller but still active, with a renewed emphasis on secrecy and low-profile operations.

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## BRANCH FIVE: THE COLOMBO FAMILY

### CLAN

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The smallest and most volatile branch, the **Colombo family**, emerged from the Profaci family. Its name came from Joe Colombo, a boss who briefly became a media figure in the 1970s by founding the Italian-American Civil Rights League. That public persona proved dangerous, and Colombo was shot at a rally—paralyzed but alive. The family then spiraled into the **second Colombo War** (1991-1993), a vicious internal war between the “Remy” and “Persico” factions that left dozens dead.

Despite its reduced membership, the Colombo family has persisted, primarily through extortion and



loan sharking. The tree of the Colombo family is characterized by internal feuds and defections, making it the least stable but also a cautionary tale of how the **New York Mafia family tree** can be split by its own branches.

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### **THE COMMISSION: THE ROOTS THAT TIED THE TREE TOGETHER**

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The **Commission** was the New York Mafia's supreme governing body, composed of the bosses of the Five Families, along with leaders from Chicago and Buffalo. This council met to authorize murders, settle territorial disputes, and enforce the rules that kept the family tree from self-destructing. When the Commission worked, it

prevented all-out war. When it failed—as during the Castellammarese War or the internal conflicts of the 1980s—the tree bled.

The Commission's power waned after the **Mafia Commission Trial** of 1986, where key bosses were convicted using RICO statutes. That trial effectively cut the roots, leaving each family to fend for itself against federal prosecutors, informants, and changing criminal markets.

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### **HOW THE NEW YORK MAFIA FAMILY TREE CHANGED OVER TIME**

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The **New York Mafia family tree** is not static; it has grown,

lost branches, and mutated. The Post-WWII era saw the families at their peak, controlling unions, bookmaking, and narcotics. The 1970s brought the infiltration of casinos and construction. But the 1980s introduced **RICO** (Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act), which allowed prosecutors to treat the entire family tree as a criminal enterprise, convicting bosses for crimes they ordered even if they never pulled a trigger.

Today, many original members are dead or imprisoned. Newer generations face greater difficulties: the old code of silence is broken more frequently, immigration patterns have shifted, and younger criminals

often prefer cybercrime or street gangs. Still, remnants of each family survive, running loansharking, gambling, and union rackets. The **New York Mafia family tree** has been pruned but not uprooted. Law enforcement estimates that there are still hundreds of made members across the Five Families, though their influence is a shadow of what it once was.

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### **COMPARING THE FAMILIES: WHICH BRANCH WAS STRONGEST?**

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Ranking the families is subjective, but a common assessment places the **Gambino family** at the top in terms of power and wealth during its heyday. The **Genovese family** is

often considered the most durable. The **Lucchese family** was a steady middle power. The **Bonanno family** fluctuated between exile and resurgence. The **Colombo family**

was the smallest and most chaotic. However, all five contributed essential fibers to the overall **New York Mafia family tree**.
