and Bible reading life. Hammond stressed that an empty house invites seven worse spirits (Matthew 12:43-45), so aftercare is not optional.

Common Criticisms and Controversies

No book on deliverance escapes criticism, and *Pigs in the Parlor* is no exception. Some theologians argue that Hammond's views border on an over-emphasis on demonology,

potentially neglecting personal responsibility and God's sovereignty. Others caution that the deliverance model can lead to psychological misdiagnosis, where treatable mental health conditions are falsely attributed to demons.
