## Correct Formulas

Write down the formula for each part before plugging in numbers.

- Rectangle:  $A = l \times w$
- Triangle:  $A = \frac{1}{2} \times b \times h$
- Circle:  $A = \pi r^2$
- Semicircle:  $A = \frac{1}{2} \pi r^2$

For perimeter, remember the circumference formulas:  $C = 2\pi r$  (full circle) or  $C = \pi r$  (semicircle's curved edge).

Add all areas together (or subtract if using that method). Add all external side lengths for the perimeter. Finally, check your work. Does the answer make sense? Is it in the correct units (square units for area, linear units for perimeter)?

### **COMMON PITFALLS AND HOW A WORKSHEET HELPS OVERCOME THEM**
