Key Political and Military

Figures

Names of generals, presidents, and politicians are essential. The most common answers include short surnames that fit neatly into grids: **Lee, Grant, Sherman, Lincoln, Davis**. Others are longer but still frequent: **McClellan, Jackson** (Stonewall), **Sheridan**.

- **Lee** – 3 letters; "Confederate general Robert E."
- **Grant** – 5 letters; "Union general and later president."
- **Stonewall** – 10 letters; "Jackson's nickname."
- **Stanton** – 7 letters; "Lincoln's Secretary of

War.”

Constructors also use initials (e.g., **U.S. Grant** might be clued as “Ulysses S. __”). Also watch for lesser-known figures like **Farragut** (Union admiral) or **Hood** (Confederate general).

Political Terms and Legislation

Words like **secession**, **emancipation**, **Reconstruction**, and **abolitionist** appear regularly. Some clues reference legislation: **Homestead Act**, **Confiscation Acts**, **Fugitive Slave Law**

(often clued as “1850 law”). **Emancipation Proclamation** is a very long entry but appears sometimes as a themed answer or in large grids.

- **Union** - 5 letters; “The North” or “What Lincoln fought to preserve.”
- **Confederacy** - 11 letters; “The South’s government.”
- **Copperhead** - 10 letters; “Northern Democrat opposed to war.”

Military Terminology and

Slang

Crosswords love short, vowel-rich words. Examples include **saber**, **corps**, **brigade**, **casualty**, **bayonet**, **musket**, **cannon**, **howitzer**. Also slang: **Reb** (Confederate soldier), **Yank** (Union soldier), **cav** (cavalry abbreviation), **commissary** (supply depot).

- **Reb** – 3 letters; “Confederate soldier, informally.”
- **Yank** – 4 letters; “Union soldier.”
- **Greyback** – 8 letters; “Confederate uniform color” (also a louse, but crosswords use the uniform sense).
- **Bluecoat** – 8

letters; “Union soldier.”

STRATEGIES FOR SOLVING CIVIL WAR CROSSWORDS

Look for Common Letter Patterns
