stable, well-paying career with excellent benefits, the **New York City Sanitation Worker Exam** is your gateway to a rewarding profession. This exam is one of the most competitive civil service tests in the city, and preparing for it can open the door to a job with a starting salary of around \$40,000 that can rise to more than \$90,000 with overtime and tenure. 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## **UNDERSTANDING THE ROLE OF A SANITATION WORKER IN NYC**

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Sanitation workers, often called “san men” or “DSNY workers,” are more than just trash collectors. They are essential emergency responders during snowstorms, flood events, and public health crises. The job requires physical stamina, attention to safety, and a commitment to serving the public. A typical day can involve collecting refuse and recycling from residential buildings, operating mechanical sweepers, or working

on snow plows during winter storms. The work is demanding but offers a sense of pride that comes from keeping the city running. Before you even think about the exam, it’s important to understand that DSNY expects its workers to be reliable, team-oriented, and physically fit.

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## **ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR THE SANITATION WORKER EXAM**

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Before you can sit for the **New York City Sanitation Worker Exam**, you must meet specific criteria. The city updates these requirements periodically, so always check the latest announcement from the Department of Citywide

Administrative Services (DCAS). As of the most recent exam cycle, the basic eligibility requirements are:

- **Age:** You must be at least 21 years old at the time of appointment. There is no maximum age limit.
- **Residency:** You must live in one of the five boroughs of New York City (Manhattan, Brooklyn, Queens, The Bronx, or Staten Island) or in certain designated suburbs within New York State. Some exams require you to be a resident at the time of application;

others allow you to move in within a set period after appointment.

- **Driver's**

**License:** A valid New York State driver's license is required at the time of appointment. A commercial driver's license (CDL) is not initially required but may be needed later for certain assignments.

- **Education:** A high school diploma or a recognized equivalency (GED) is usually required. Some work experience may be accepted in lieu of a diploma, but the standard is a high school

credential.

- **Physical and Medical**

**Standards:** You must pass a medical examination and a physical performance test before you can be appointed. The physical test includes tasks like lifting heavy loads and climbing onto trucks.

- **Background**

**Check:** A thorough background investigation, including a drug screening, is conducted.

It is critical to note that the exam is typically offered only every few years, and the number of applicants far exceeds available positions. Meeting the

eligibility requirements is only the first step; scoring well on the exam is essential to make it onto the list of candidates who are eventually called for hiring.

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## THE STRUCTURE AND CONTENT OF THE SANITATION WORKER EXAM

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The **New York City Sanitation Worker Exam** is a written multiple-choice test designed to measure your aptitude for the job. It does not test specific knowledge of garbage collection or machinery; instead, it assesses basic skills that are relevant to the work. The exam typically covers the following areas:

# Verbal Comprehension

You will be asked to read passages and answer questions about main ideas, details, and vocabulary. This section evaluates your ability to understand written instructions, safety protocols, and communication materials used in the field.

# Sequencing

Basic math skills are essential. Questions may involve addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, fractions, decimals, and percentages. You may also see number patterns and sequences. No calculators are allowed, so practice mental arithmetic.

# Mechanical Aptitude

This section tests your understanding of simple machines, tools, and basic mechanical principles. For example, you might be

asked about levers, pulleys, gears, or how force is applied. Familiarity with everyday mechanical concepts is helpful.

## Spatial and Map Reading

DSNY workers need to navigate city streets and read maps. Expect questions that involve interpreting street grids, identifying locations, and following simple routes. This measures your sense of direction and ability to use maps or diagrams.

Some exams include a memory component where you are shown an image or a set of facts (e.g., a safety checklist) and then asked questions about it without referencing the original material. This tests your attention to detail and short-term recall.

The exam is typically about two hours long, and the passing score is determined by the city based on the number of candidates and available positions. In past exams, a raw score of 70% or higher was required to pass, but the final list uses a composite score that

can be boosted by veterans' credits or other preferences. Your score determines your rank on the eligible list, and higher scores mean you are more likely to be called for an interview and hire.

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## HOW TO APPLY FOR THE EXAM

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The application process for the **New York City Sanitation Worker Exam** is conducted entirely online through the DCAS website ([nyc.gov/dcas](http://nyc.gov/dcas)). Here is a step-by-step overview:

1. **Find the Exam Announcement**  
: Check DCAS's website for the latest "Sanitation Worker" exam announcement. It will include the application period, fee

(usually around \$40-\$60), and all eligibility details.

2. **Create an Account:** You will need to register on the Online Application System (OASys) if you haven't already. Provide accurate personal information.
3. **Complete the Application:** Fill out the online form, including your education, work history, and residency. Be honest – any false information can disqualify you.
4. **Pay the Fee:** Pay the non-refundable application fee via credit card or electronic check.

Fee waivers are available for qualifying low-income applicants.

5. **Schedule Your**

**Test:** After your application is accepted, you will receive a notice to select your preferred test date and location. Seats fill up quickly, so schedule early.

6. **Prepare:** Use the free study materials provided by DCAS. They often publish a “test guide” that includes sample questions. Practice under timed conditions.

After you take the exam, your score will typically be available online within a few months. The list of

eligible candidates is then established and remains active for up to four years. However, hiring waves depend on DSNY’s needs, so being high on the list is critical.

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### **AFTER THE EXAM: WHAT HAPPENS WHEN YOU PASS?**

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Passing the **New York City Sanitation Worker Exam** does not guarantee a job; it puts you on a list. Candidates are called in order of their exam score (plus any veteran or residency credits). Once you receive a notice of potential appointment, you will go through several stages:

## Screening

You must submit to a thorough background check, including criminal history, driving record, and employment verification. A drug test is also part of the process. Any disqualifying factors, such as a felony conviction or a pattern of unsafe driving, can remove you from consideration.

# Medical Examinati on

DSNY sets strict medical standards to ensure you can perform the physical demands of the job. You will undergo a full physical exam, including vision and hearing tests, and may need to demonstrate your ability to lift and carry heavy objects. Some conditions may require a waiver or accommodation.

# Physical Test and Training

Before your final appointment, you must pass a physical agility test. This often includes tasks like stepping onto a simulated truck step, lifting a weighted bag to a certain height, and dragging a heavy object. The exact test may vary, but it is meant to simulate the physical tasks of the job. It's wise to start a fitness routine focusing on lower body and core strength.

## Probationary Period

Once hired, you will enter the DSNY Academy for several weeks of classroom and hands-on training. Topics include safety procedures, equipment operation, route navigation, and customer service. After the academy, you will work under a field training officer. Your probationary period typically lasts 12 months, during which your performance is closely evaluated. Successfully completing probation leads to permanent civil service status.

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### **COMPENSATION, BENEFITS, AND CAREER GROWTH**

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One of the main

reasons the **New York City Sanitation Worker Exam** is so competitive is the outstanding compensation package. Starting salaries as of 2025 are approximately \$42,000 per year, but with regular overtime and night differentials, many workers earn over \$70,000 in their first few years. Top-scale workers with five or more years of experience can earn more than \$90,000 before overtime. Additionally, DSNY workers enjoy:

- **Excellent medical, dental, and vision coverage** for themselves and their families.
- **Pension plan** through the New York City

Employees' Retirement System (NYCERS), with the option to retire after 22 years of service.

- **Paid vacation, sick leave, and holidays.**
- **Job security** as a civil service employee.
- **Opportunities for promotion** to supervisory roles (e.g., Supervisor of Sanitation, Superintendent) or specialized units (e.g., snow operations, mechanical repair, or recycling).

Many sanitation workers also take advantage of tuition reimbursement programs and can move into

administrative roles within the department or other city agencies. The career is not just a job; it's a pathway to a stable middle-class life in New York City.

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### **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS**

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## How often is the Sanitation Worker Exam offered?

It is offered irregularly, typically every two to four years, depending on attrition and city hiring needs. Sign up

for notifications from DCAS to be alerted when a new exam is announced.

## Can I take the exam if I don't live in NYC?

Yes, but only if you live in certain counties in New York State that are designated as "residency areas." These may include Westchester, Rockland, Putnam, Suffolk, Nassau, and Orange counties. Always check the specific announcement for current residency rules.

What is the best way to study for the exam?

Use the official DCAS test guide, which contains sample questions and information about each section. Practice arithmetic and reading comprehension daily. Several private companies also offer study guides and online practice tests tailored to the sanitation worker exam. Focus on time management, as the test is timed.

Is there an age limit?

There is no maximum age, but you must be at least 21 at the time of appointment. Many older workers have successfully started new careers with DSNY.

Can I use a calculator?

No. You must perform all math by hand. Practice multiplication, division, and fractions without a calculator to improve speed and

accuracy.
