BASIC ARITHMETIC VOCABULARY

Addition and Subtraction

- **Addition:** The process of combining two or more numbers to find a total. The symbol is +. Example: $3 + 5 = 8$.
- **Sum:** The result of an addition problem. In $3 + 5 = 8$, the sum is 8.
- **Addend:** Any of the numbers being added together. In $3 + 5$, both 3 and 5 are addends.
- **Subtraction:** The operation of taking one number away from another to find the difference. Symbol: $-$. Example: $9 - 4 = 5$.
- **Difference:** The result of a subtraction problem. In $9 - 4 = 5$, the difference is 5.
- **Minuend:** The number from which another number is subtracted. In $9 - 4$, the minuend is 9.
- **Subtrahend:** The number that is subtracted. In $9 - 4$, the subtrahend is 4.

Multiplication and Division

- **Multiplication:** The operation of adding a number to itself a certain number of times. Symbol: $\times$ or $\cdot$. Example: $4 \times 3 = 12$.
- **Product:** The result of multiplication. In $4 \times 3 = 12$, the product is 12.
- **Factor:** Any number being multiplied. In 4×3 , both 4 and 3 are factors.
- **Division:** The operation of splitting a number into equal parts. Symbol: $\div$ or $/$. Example: $10 \div 2 = 5$.
- **Quotient:** The result of division. In $10 \div 2 = 5$, the quotient is 5.
- **Dividend:** The number being divided. In $10 \div 2$, the dividend is 10.
- **Divisor:** The number by which another number is divided. In $10 \div 2$, the divisor is 2.
- **Remainder:** The amount left over after division when the dividend is not a multiple of the divisor. Example: $10 \div 3 = 3$ with a remainder of 1.

GEOMETRY VOCABULARY

Geometry uses precise language to describe shapes, spaces, and their properties. Knowing these terms helps you visualize and solve spatial problems.

Points, Lines, and Angles

- **Point:** A exact location in space, usually represented by a dot. It has no size or dimension.
- **Line:** A straight, infinite set of points extending in both directions. It has no thickness.
- **Line Segment:** A part of a line with two distinct endpoints.
- **Ray:** A part of a line that starts at one endpoint and extends infinitely in one direction.
- **Angle:** The figure formed by two rays sharing a common endpoint (the vertex). Measured in degrees.
- **Vertex:** The common endpoint where two rays or line segments meet to form an angle.
- **Right Angle:** An angle that measures exactly 90° .
- **Acute Angle:** An angle measuring less than 90° .
- **Obtuse Angle:** An angle measuring more than 90° but less than 180° .
- **Parallel Lines:** Lines in the same plane that never meet, no matter how far extended.

- **Perpendicular Lines:** Lines that intersect at a right angle (90°).

Shapes and Figures

- **Triangle:** A three-sided polygon. Types include equilateral (all sides equal), isosceles (two sides equal), and scalene (no sides equal).
- **Quadrilateral:** A four-sided polygon. Examples: square, rectangle, parallelogram, rhombus, trapezoid.
- **Polygon:** A closed shape made of straight line segments. Named by number of sides (e.g., pentagon for 5 sides).
- **Circle:** A set of all points in a plane equidistant from a center point.
- **Radius:** The distance from the center of a circle to any point on the circle.
- **Diameter:** A line segment through the center connecting two points on the circle. It is twice the radius.
- **Circumference:** The perimeter or distance around a circle.
- **Area:** The amount of space inside a two-dimensional shape, measured in square units.
- **Perimeter:** The total distance around the boundary of a two-dimensional shape.
- **Volume:** The amount of space occupied by a three-dimensional object, measured in cubic units.

ALGEBRA VOCABULARY

Algebra introduces symbols and letters to represent numbers and relationships. Mastering its vocabulary unlocks higher-level math.

- **Variable:** A symbol, usually a letter, that represents an unknown or changeable number. Example: x in $2x + 3 = 7$.
- **Constant:** A fixed value that does not change. In $2x + 3$, the 3 is a constant.
- **Coefficient:** A number multiplied by a variable. In $2x$, 2 is the coefficient of x .
- **Expression:** A mathematical phrase combining numbers, variables, and operations. Example: $4y - 7$.
- **Equation:** A statement that two expressions are equal, shown by an equals sign. Example: $4y - 7 = 9$.
- **Term:** A single part of an expression, separated by + or $-$ signs. In $2x + 3$, the terms are $2x$ and 3.
- **Polynomial:** An expression made up of variables, coefficients, and exponents, combined using addition, subtraction, and multiplication. Example: $3x^2 + 2x - 5$.
- **Monomial:** A polynomial with exactly one term. Example: $7x^3$.
- **Binomial:** A polynomial with two terms. Example: $x + 4$.
- **Exponent:** A small number written above and to the right of a base number, indicating how many times the base is multiplied by itself. In 5^3 , the exponent is 3, meaning $5 \times 5 \times 5$.
- **Base:** The number that is being multiplied by itself when raised to an exponent. In 5^3 , the base is 5.
- **Inequality:** A mathematical statement that uses symbols like $<$, $>$, $\leq$, or $\geq$ to compare values. Example: $x > 4$.
- **Function:** A relation where each input (usually x) has exactly one output (usually y or $f(x)$). Example: $f(x) = 2x + 1$.

STATISTICS AND PROBABILITY VOCABULARY

Statistics and probability help us collect, analyze, and interpret data to make informed decisions.

- **Data:** A collection of facts, numbers, or information used for analysis.
- **Mean:** The average of a set of numbers. Calculated by adding all numbers and dividing by the count. Example: Mean of 2, 4, 6 is $(2+4+6)/3 = 4$.
- **Median:** The middle value in a data set when arranged in ascending order. If there is an even number of values, the median is the average of the two middle numbers.
- **Mode:** The value that appears most frequently in a data set. Sets can have one, more than one, or no mode.
- **Range:** The difference between the highest and lowest values in a data set. Example: For 3, 7, 12, the range is $12 - 3 = 9$.
- **Probability:** A measure of how likely an event is to occur, expressed as a number between 0 and 1. Example: The probability of flipping a coin and getting heads is $1/2$.
- **Outcome:** A possible result of a probability experiment. For a dice roll, outcomes are 1 through 6.
- **Event:** A specific set of outcomes. For example, rolling an even number on a die includes outcomes 2, 4, 6.
- **Sample Space:** The set of all possible outcomes. For a coin flip, sample space is {heads, tails}.
- **Frequency:** The number of times a particular data value or event occurs.
- **Histogram:** A bar graph that displays the frequency of data in intervals.

FRACTIONS, DECIMALS, AND PERCENTAGES

These interconnected concepts are essential for everyday calculations and more advanced math.

- **Fraction:** A number representing a part of a whole. Written as a numerator over a denominator. Example: $\frac{3}{4}$ means 3 parts out of 4 equal parts.
- **Numerator:** The top number in a fraction. It shows how many parts are taken. In $\frac{3}{4}$, the numerator is 3.

- **Denominator:** The bottom number in a fraction. It shows the total number of equal parts. In $\frac{3}{4}$, the denominator is 4.
- **Proper Fraction:** A fraction where the numerator is smaller than the denominator (e.g., $\frac{2}{5}$).
- **Improper Fraction:** A fraction where the numerator is greater than or equal to the denominator (e.g., $\frac{7}{4}$).
- **Mixed Number:** A number made of a whole number and a proper fraction. Example: $1\frac{3}{4}$.
- **Decimal:** A number that uses a decimal point to show a fraction of ten, hundred, thousand, etc. Example: 0.75 equals $\frac{75}{100}$.
- **Percentage:** A way of expressing a number as a part of 100, denoted by the % symbol. 75% means 75 per 100, or 0.75.
