- **¡Feliz cumpleaños!** 🎂 (with emojis)
- **¡Muchas felicidades en tu día!**
- **Disfruta tu día. Te mereces lo mejor.** – “Enjoy your day. You deserve the best.”
- **¡Que cumplas muchos más!** – “May you have many more!”

THE TRADITIONAL SPANISH BIRTHDAY SONG

No discussion of **how to say happy birthday in Spanish** would be complete without mentioning the birthday song. The Spanish version of “Happy Birthday” is sung throughout the Spanish-speaking world, though there are slight variations.

Latin American Version

Notice the difference: the Latin American version says “te deseamos todos” (“we all wish you”), while the Spain version says “que cumplas muchos años” (“may you have many years”). Both are heartfelt and commonly sung at parties.

CULTURAL TRADITIONS: HOW BIRTHDAYS ARE CELEBRATED IN SPANISH-SPEAKING COUNTRIES
