Step 1: Laying the Foundation with Basic Shapes

Begin by lightly sketching a large oval in the center of your page. This oval will form Nemo's main body. It should be slightly tilted, as Nemo is rarely perfectly horizontal; he is always exploring. Next, draw a smaller, slightly overlapping circle on the left side of the oval. This will be his head. The circle should be about one-third the size of the oval. Step 2: Mapping the Facial Features and

Eyes

Inside each eye, draw a smaller circle for the pupil, and remember to leave a tiny white dot for the highlight — this brings life to his gaze. Above the eyes, sketch two small, curved lines for his eyebrows. These are crucial for conveying emotion. Below the eyes, draw a small, smiling mouth. It is simply a curved line with tiny corners turned up. Do not overcomplicate the mouth; simplicity is key to the character's charm.

Step 3: Defining the Body, Stripes, and "Lucky Fin"

Now connect the head and body with a smooth, continuous line. Nemo's body should have a gentle curve to it. Start drawing the three distinctive white stripes that run vertically down his body. The first stripe is just behind the head, the second crosses the middle of the body, and the third is near the tail. These stripes are not perfectly straight; they have a gentle wave that follows the contour of his body. This is a critical detail in **how to draw a Nemo** accurately. On the right side of his body (your left as you look at him), sketch his smaller "lucky fin." It should be noticeably smaller than the fin on the other side, with a slight, endearing curve.

Step 4: Adding the Dorsal, Pectoral, and Tail Fins

On the side of his body, draw the larger pectoral fin. This fin is used for steering and is broad and rounded. Finally, refine the tail fin. Nemo's tail is large and fan-shaped, with a slight split in the middle. Add soft, flowing lines inside the tail to suggest the rays of the fin. These details will make your drawing feel dynamic and fluid.

Step 5: Inking and Erasing Guidelines

Once you are satisfied with your pencil sketch, it is time to make it permanent. Use a fine-liner pen (0.3 or 0.5 is ideal) to carefully trace over your final lines. Start with the outline of the body and head, then move to the fins, eyes, and stripes. Be patient and let the ink dry completely before erasing any pencil marks. Once the ink is dry, gently erase all the underlying pencil guidelines. You should now have a crisp, clean line drawing of Nemo, ready for color.

ADDING COLOR: BRINGING THE CORAL REEF TO LIFE

Color is where Nemo truly comes alive. The vibrant orange is his signature, but there is nuance to it. When learning **how to draw a Nemo**, do not just use one flat orange. - **Drawing the stripes as straight lines.** The white stripes should curve gently to follow the roundness of his body. Straight stripes will make him look flat and two-dimensional.
- **Making the mouth too large or detailed.** Nemo's mouth is simple and small. Overcomplicating it will make him look older or less cute.
- **Ignoring the tail fin's shape.** The tail is fan-like and soft, not a sharp triangle. Take time to get its flow correct.

PRO TIPS FOR ENHANCING YOUR NEMO DRAWING

Beyond the basic steps, there are subtle techniques that can elevate your drawing from good to great. These tips come from observing the original animation and understanding how the character moves.

Capturing Movement and Expressiveness

Nemo is a character full of energy. To capture this, do not draw him perfectly still. Give his body a slight curve, as if he is swimming to the left or right. DIFFERENT POSES AND EXPRESSIONS TO PRACTICE

Once you have mastered the standard front-facing or side profile, challenge yourself with different poses. This will deepen your understanding of **how to draw a Nemo** in any situation. Try drawing Nemo looking up, as if he is marveling at the surface of the ocean. Draw him swimming quickly, with his fins pulled back and his tail in a strong curve.
