The Role of the Failure Mode Identifier (FMI)

For instance, an FMI of 1 indicates that the data is low or below the normal operating range, while an FMI of 0 means the data is too high. Other common FMI values include 3 (voltage above normal or shorted high), 4 (voltage below normal or shorted low), and 31 (condition exists but not fully defined).

When you combine an Spn with an FMI, you get a complete diagnostic picture.

For example, an Spn Fault Code of 100 with FMI 1 might indicate that the engine oil pressure is below the acceptable range. This is far more useful than a generic "check engine" light. Technicians can immediately begin troubleshooting the oil pressure sensor, the wiring, or the oil pump itself, depending on the context.

COMMON SPN FAULT CODES AND THEIR MEANINGS

- **Spn 168** – Battery Potential / Power Input. Electrical system faults often trace back to this parameter, especially in modern vehicles with complex electronics.
 - **Spn 3516** – Aftertreatment 1 Diesel Particulate Filter (DPF) Differential Pressure. This code is common in newer trucks with emissions systems. It often indicates a clogged or failing DPF.
 - **Spn 3610** – Aftertreatment 1 SCR Catalyst Conversion Efficiency. This relates to the Selective

Catalytic Reduction system and can point to issues with DEF quality or dosage.

It is important to note that the same Spn Fault Code can have different meanings depending on the vehicle manufacturer. Always consult the specific service manual for your make and model to interpret codes accurately.
