He struck out only 1,840 times in 11,195 plate appearances, a rate of just 16.4% — a testament to his hand-eye coordination and contact ability.

The Shortstop with a Gap-to-Gap Approach

While Jeter was not a home run masher, his power numbers are still impressive for a shortstop. He hit 260 career home runs, with a single-season high of 24 in 1999. More importantly, he was a consistent double machine. His 3,465 hits include 544 doubles and 66 triples. His career slugging percentage (SLG) is .440, and his OPS (On-base Plus Slugging) is .817. These numbers are particularly outstanding when you consider his position. For context, the average shortstop during Jeter's era had

significantly lower numbers, making his offensive production elite for the position. His isolated power (ISO) of .130 shows he was a gap-to-gap hitter who could drive the ball into the alleys, turning singles into extra-base hits.

The 3,000 Hit Milestone and All-Time Rankings

Jeter's pursuit of 3,000 hits was one of the most anticipated moments in baseball history. He reached the milestone on July 9, 2011, with a home

run against the Tampa Bay Rays. At the time, he was the 28th player in MLB history to reach 3,000 hits and the first to do it as a Yankee. His final hit total of 3,465 ranks sixth on the all-time list, behind only Pete Rose, Ty Cobb, Hank Aaron, Stan Musial, and Tris Speaker. Among shortstops, he is the all-time hits leader by a wide margin. This is arguably the most cherished number in **career stats for Derek Jeter** because it epitomizes his durability and longevity. He averaged 173 hits per season over his 20-year career, a remarkable feat.

Postseason

Dominance: The Clutch Performer

His defensive Wins Above Replacement (dWAR) of 4.8 is solid, though not elite.

Advanced Metrics: WAR

and JAWS

For a more complete picture of **Derek Jeter's career stats**, we turn to advanced metrics. Wins Above Replacement (WAR) attempts to measure a player's total contributions. Jeter's career WAR, according to Baseball-Reference, is 71.3. This ranks him among the top 100 players in MLB history and as one of the top 10 shortstops ever. Using the JAWS (Jaffe WAR Score) system, which averages a player's career WAR with their peak seven-year WAR, Jeter scores 57.5, placing him above the Hall of Fame average for shortstops. His peak years from 1998 to 2006 saw him average over 5 WAR per season. He also had

2,508 runs created (RC) and a runs created per 27 outs (RC/27) of 6.16, indicating he was a highly productive offensive player per game.

Longevity and Durability: The Ironman of the Yankees

A key component of **Jeter's statistical legacy** is his incredible durability. He played in at least 145 games in 15 of his 20 seasons. He missed significant time only in his final two seasons due to injuries. He holds the Yankees franchise

record for both hits (3,465) and games played (2,747). His streak of playing in 157 or more games from 2003 to 2008 is remarkable for a shortstop. This longevity allowed him to accumulate counting stats that few in history have matched. He also ranks high on the all-time list for at-bats (11,195) and plate appearances, showing he was always in the lineup.

Comparison to Peers and Hall of Fame Shortstops

How do **Derek Jeter's career stats** compare to other all-time great

shortstops? He leads all shortstops in hits, runs (1,923), and games played. He is second in doubles (544) among shortstops to only Honus Wagner.
