The second method is faster when the fractions do not produce an improper sum.

Subtraction Requiring Borrowing

Problem: $5\frac{1}{6} - 2\frac{5}{6}$
Strategy: Notice $\frac{1}{6} < \frac{5}{6}$, so borrow. Convert $5\frac{1}{6}$ to $4\frac{7}{6}$ (since $1 = \frac{6}{6}$, add to $\frac{1}{6}$ gives $\frac{7}{6}$). Then subtract: $4 - 2 = 2$, and $\frac{7}{6} - \frac{5}{6} = \frac{2}{6} = \frac{1}{3}$. Answer: $2\frac{1}{3}$.

Mixed Operations Worksheet

Some worksheets mix addition and subtraction problems to challenge students to switch between operations. For example, $3\frac{2}{5} + 1\frac{4}{5} - 2\frac{1}{5}$.
