If it looks dark, smells burnt, or contains particles, have it serviced immediately. Most transmissions require a fluid change every 30,000 to 60,000 miles.

Brake Fluid

Brake fluid transfers force from the pedal to the brakes. Over time, it absorbs moisture, which can reduce braking performance and cause corrosion. Check the brake fluid reservoir monthly; the level should be near the “Max” line. If it is consistently low, inspect for leaks. Replace brake fluid every two years or as

recommended in your manual.

Power Steering Fluid

This fluid makes steering easier. Locate the reservoir (often near the engine bay) and check the level with the engine off. It should be between the hot and cold marks. Top off with the correct fluid type if low. A whining noise when turning may indicate a leak or low fluid.

Windshield Washer Fluid

Keep the washer reservoir full, especially during seasons with rain, snow, or dust. Use a fluid designed for your climate—summer formulas remove bugs and road grime, while winter blends include antifreeze to prevent freezing.

UNDER THE HOOD: BELTS, HOSES, AND FILTERS

Serpentine Belt

The serpentine belt drives the alternator, water pump, power steering pump, and air conditioning compressor. Inspect it every few months for cracks, fraying, or glazing. Most belts last 60,000 to 100,000 miles. A squealing noise or visible damage signals replacement is needed.

Hoses

Check radiator and heater hoses for soft spots, bulges, cracks, or leaks. Squeeze them when cool—they should feel firm but not brittle. Replace any hose that shows signs of deterioration to prevent overheating or coolant loss.

Air Filter

A clean engine air filter improves fuel efficiency and acceleration. Inspect it every 12,000 miles and replace it if it appears dirty or clogged. The cabin air filter, which cleans the air inside the passenger compartment, should also be changed every 15,000 to 30,000 miles.

Spark Plugs

Spark plugs ignite the fuel-air mixture in the engine. Worn spark plugs can cause misfires, poor fuel economy, and hard starts. Check your manual for replacement intervals—typically 30,000 to 100,000 miles depending on the type.

WHEELS, TIRES, AND BRAKES: SAFETY FIRST

Tire Pressure and Tread

Depth

Proper tire pressure is critical for handling, braking, and fuel efficiency. Check pressure monthly using a reliable gauge, and adjust to the PSI listed on the driver's door jamb or in the owner's manual. Don't rely on the maximum pressure molded on the sidewall. Also measure tread depth—use the penny test: insert a penny into the tread with Lincoln's head down; if you see the top of his head, the tires are worn and should be replaced. Rotate tires every 5,000 to 7,500 miles to ensure even wear.

Wheel Alignment and Balancing

If your car pulls to one side, the steering wheel vibrates, or tires wear unevenly, have the alignment checked. Balancing prevents vibration at highway speeds. Both are essential for tire longevity and safe handling.

Brake System

Listen for squealing, grinding, or pulsation when braking. These sounds indicate worn brake pads or damaged rotors. Have your brakes inspected annually or every 12,000 miles. Brake pads typically need replacement between 30,000 and 70,000 miles, but driving habits and conditions affect longevity.

BATTERY AND ELECTRICAL SYSTEM

The battery provides the electrical power to start your car and run accessories. Check battery terminals for corrosion (a white or blue powdery buildup) and clean them with a wire brush if needed. Ensure the battery is securely mounted. Most car batteries last three to five years. If your engine cranks slowly or the lights dim, have the battery tested. Cabin Maintenance

Regularly clean the interior to prevent wear and tear. Vacuum carpets and seats, wipe down dashboard and door panels with appropriate cleaners, and treat leather seats with conditioner. Check the operation of seatbelts, windows, locks, and climate control. A clean interior also reduces allergens and improves driving comfort.

Exterior Protection

Washing and waxing your car protects the paint from environmental damage like bird droppings, tree sap, road salt, and UV rays. Aim to wash your car every two weeks and wax it every three months.
