Though Tywin Lannister does not appear in King's Landing until later in the series, his influence permeates every scene involving his children. As the head of House Lannister, he is the wealthiest and most feared lord in Westeros. Tywin's obsession with legacy and his disdain for weakness shapes the actions of Cersei, Jaime, and Tyrion. In Season 1, his off-screen presence is a constant reminder of the Lannisters' power,

The Lannister siblings are the most entangled in the political web of Season 1. Cersei Lannister is the queen, married to King Robert Baratheon, but her true loyalty lies with her twin brother, Jaime. Their secret relationship is the

foundation of a massive deception that threatens the entire realm. Jaime, a member of the Kingsguard, is a skilled swordsman with a callous streak. Tyrion, the dwarf, is the family's intellectual outcast, underestimated by his father and sister but possessing a sharp wit and hidden depths. Rhaegar Targaryen: The Ghost in the Lineage

Though he died years before the events of Season 1, Rhaegar Targaryen is a pivotal figure in the family tree. His alleged

abduction (or elopement) with Lyanna Stark sparked Robert's Rebellion. His children, Rhaenys and Aegon, were brutally murdered during the sack of King's Landing. Rhaegar's legacy casts a long shadow over the entire season, influencing Ned's memories, Robert's bitterness, and Daenerys's sense of destiny.
