ESSENTIAL MATERIALS AND TOOLS FOR PAPER FLOWER FOLDING

Before you begin learning how to make easy origami flowers step by step, it helps to gather a few basic supplies. The beauty of origami is that you need very little to get started, but having the right materials can make a significant difference in your results.

Choosing the Right Paper

Standard origami paper, known as kami, is an excellent choice

for beginners. It is thin, easy to fold, and holds creases well. These sheets are typically colored on one side and white on the other, which adds contrast and depth to your flowers. For a more realistic look, you can experiment with washi paper, which has a subtle texture and beautiful patterns. If you do not have specialized origami paper, you can cut copy paper or scrapbook paper into squares. However, thicker paper can be more difficult to fold precisely, especially for detailed steps. For your first few projects, stick with lightweight paper measuring 15 cm by 15 cm or 6 inches by 6 inches. This size is manageable and produces a finished flower that is large

enough to appreciate.

Additional Tools to Have on Hand

While your hands are your primary tool, a few accessories can improve your folding experience. A bone folder or a dull butter knife helps create sharp, crisp creases. A ruler is useful for measuring and cutting paper if you are making your own squares. A pair of tweezers can assist with fine adjustments on small projects. Finally, consider using a spray bottle with a light mist of water for delicate paper that tends to unfold, though

this is rarely necessary for simple designs. Keeping these items nearby allows you to focus on the folding process without interruption.

UNDERSTANDING BASIC ORIGAMI FOLDS

All origami flowers are built from a small set of fundamental folds. Familiarizing yourself with these basic techniques will make every step clearer and more intuitive.

The Valley Fold and Mountain

Fold

The valley fold is the most common fold in origami. You bring the paper toward you so that the crease forms a V shape when you look at it from the side. The mountain fold is the opposite; you fold the paper away from you, creating an upside-down V. These two folds are the building blocks of almost every origami model. When you see arrow symbols in diagrams, a dashed line usually indicates a valley fold, while a line of dashes and dots indicates a mountain fold.

The Squash

Fold

A squash fold involves opening a flap of paper and pressing it flat into a new shape. This technique is common when forming the petals of many flowers. It requires a gentle touch and patience. Once you master the squash fold, you will find it appears in numerous designs, from lilies to iris blossoms.

The Petal Fold

The petal fold is slightly more complex but essential for creating realistic flower shapes. It involves lifting a flap, folding the sides inward, and then flattening the tip. This fold adds

dimension and structure to your flowers, making them look more like real blooms.

HOW TO MAKE EASY ORIGAMI FLOWERS STEP BY STEP: THREE SIMPLE DESIGNS

Now it is time to put your knowledge into practice. Below are three beginner-friendly flower designs. Each one builds on the previous, allowing you to develop your skills gradually.

Design One: The Classic

Origami Tulip

The origami tulip is one of the simplest flowers to fold and a wonderful introduction to the art. It requires only a few steps and produces a charming, recognizable bloom.

1. **Start with a square piece of paper.** Place it with the colored side facing down. Fold it in half diagonally to form a triangle, then unfold. Repeat with the other diagonal to create an X crease. Flip the paper over and fold it in half horizontally and vertically, creating a plus

sign crease.

These folds will help collapse the paper later.

2. **Collapse the paper into a triangle base.**

Bring the left and right edges of the paper together while pushing the top edge down. This should form a smaller triangle with a flap on each side. This shape is called a triangle base or waterbomb base.

3. **Fold the corners upward.**

Take the bottom left corner of the top layer and fold it upward so that it meets the top point of the triangle. Repeat with the bottom right corner. The

shape should now look like a diamond with two flaps.

4. **Fold the edges inward.**

Take the left and right corners of the diamond and fold them toward the center line. Your paper now resembles a kite shape.

5. **Fold the top flaps down.**

Fold the two top triangular flaps downward, tucking them into the pockets created in the previous step. This locks the shape.

6. **Flip the paper over and repeat.**

Fold the bottom corners upward again, then fold the edges inward.

Tuck the top flaps down as before.

7. **Open the flower.** Hold the base of the folded paper and gently pull the four petals apart. Use your fingers to curl them slightly outward for a more natural look. Your origami tulip is complete.

You can attach the tulip to a stem made from a green paper strip rolled tightly or use a drinking straw wrapped in green tape. Place several tulips together for a cheerful spring bouquet that never wilts.

Design

Two: The Simple Origami Lily

The lily is a classic origami flower that looks more complex than it actually is. Once you know the tulip, the lily is a natural next step.

1. **Begin with a square piece of paper.** Place it colored side down. Fold it in half diagonally both ways, then unfold. Fold it in half horizontally and vertically, then unfold. You should have a clear grid of creases.
2. **Create a**

preliminary base. Collapse the paper by bringing the left and right edges together while pushing the top edge down. This forms a square shape with two flaps on each side. This is called a preliminary base or square base.

3. **Fold the flaps to the center.** Take the bottom left edge of the top layer and fold it to the center vertical crease. Repeat with the bottom right edge. The shape now looks like a diamond with the bottom edges meeting in the middle.
4. **Unfold and squash fold.**

Unfold the two flaps you just made. Lift the bottom point of the top layer and fold it upward along the crease lines. As you lift, the sides will collapse inward. Flatten the paper to form a squash fold. This creates a long, diamond-shaped petal.

5. **Repeat on all four sides.** Turn the paper and repeat the squash fold on the other three flaps. After completing all four, your paper should have four long, narrow petals pointing upward.
6. **Fold the top edges down.** Take the top layer of one petal

and fold the left and right edges toward the center line. Repeat for all four petals. This thins the petals further.

7. **Shape the petals.** Carefully curl the tips of each petal outward using your fingers or a pencil. You can also gently blow into the base of the flower to puff it out slightly. Your origami lily is ready.

The lily looks stunning when made with paper that has a subtle gradient or shimmer. Group several lilies together with varying petal curls for a dynamic display.

Design Three: The Easy Origami Blossom

This five-petal flower is slightly different because it uses a pentagon as its starting shape. It produces a soft, rounded blossom reminiscent of cherry or plum flowers.

1. **Create a pentagon from a square.** Fold a square piece of paper in half. Bring the top right corner down to meet the bottom edge, creating a

diagonal crease. Unfold. Bring the bottom left corner up to meet the top edge, creating another diagonal crease. Unfold. You will see a small triangle formed at the center. Fold the paper along the edges of this triangle to create a pentagon shape. Trim or tear away the excess paper.

2. **Fold the pentagon in half.** Bring one edge of the pentagon to meet the opposite edge, creating a triangle. Unfold. Repeat for all five edges, creating a star-like crease

pattern.

3. **Collapse the paper.** Gently push the edges inward along the creases to form a smaller pentagon with flaps. This is a pentagon base.
4. **Fold the flaps outward.** Take each flap and fold it outward at an angle. This creates the petals. You can adjust the angle to make the flower more open or closed.
5. **Shape the petals.** Curl each petal slightly with your fingers. You can also use a rounded object like a pen cap to give the petals a gentle curve. Your blossom is complete.

These blossoms are perfect for creating garlands or decorating gift boxes. Their small size and delicate appearance make them a favorite for card making and scrapbooking.

TIPS FOR ACHIEVING CLEAN FOLDS AND BEAUTIFUL RESULTS

Even simple origami flowers require attention to detail. The following tips will help you achieve professional-looking results every time.

- **Work on a hard, flat surface.** Folding on a table or desk provides stability and helps you make precise creases. Avoid folding in

your lap or on uneven surfaces.

- **Use a bone folder or your fingernail.** Running a bone folder or your fingernail along each crease ensures the fold stays sharp. Crisp creases are essential for the paper to hold its shape.
- **Take your time.** Rushing through steps leads to misaligned edges and sloppy results. Enjoy the process and fold at a comfortable pace.
- **Practice on scrap paper first.** If you are trying a new design for the first time, use inexpensive

paper to practice. Once you feel confident, move to your decorative paper.

- **Watch for symmetry.** When folding flaps or corners, ensure both sides are even. Symmetry is key to a balanced flower.
- **Use paper clips or clothespins.** For steps that

require holding layers together while you fold other parts, a small clip can be very helpful.
