Press firmly with your fingertips, avoiding any buzzing. Strum each chord individually and listen for clarity.

Step 3: Practice the Verse Progression Slowly

Set a metronome to a slow tempo, around 60 beats per minute. Play the verse pattern: G (4 beats), C (2 beats), G (2 beats), D (4 beats), Em (4 beats), C (4 beats), G (2 beats), D (2 beats). Repeat this loop until the transitions feel natural. Do not rush. Speed will come with time.

Step 4: Add the Chorus

The chorus progression: G (4 beats), C (4 beats), G (4 beats), D (4 beats), C (4 beats), G (4 beats), D (4 beats), G (4 beats). Notice the return to G at the end, giving a sense of conclusion.

Step 5: Incorporate Dynamics
