To assemble a full set, you will need one quarter for each of the fifty states, issued in the following order:

- 1999: Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Georgia, Connecticut
- 2000: Massachusetts, Maryland, South Carolina, New Hampshire, Virginia
- 2001: New York, North Carolina, Rhode Island, Vermont, Kentucky
- 2002: Tennessee, Ohio, Louisiana, Indiana, Mississippi
- 2003: Illinois, Alabama, Maine, Missouri, Arkansas
- 2004: Michigan, Florida, Texas, Iowa, Wisconsin
- 2005: California, Minnesota, Oregon, Kansas, West Virginia
- 2006: Nevada, Nebraska, Colorado, North Dakota, South Dakota
- 2007: Montana, Washington, Idaho, Wyoming, Utah
- 2008: Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona, Alaska, Hawaii

Of course, many collectors also aim to include the six additional quarters from the **District of Columbia and U.S. Territories** program that followed, but the core of the collecting world remains the original fifty states series.

HOW TO START BUILDING YOUR COLLECTION

Getting started with **the Fifty United States Quarter Dollar Collection** is easier than you might think. Because the coins were minted in such large numbers, many of them can still be found in circulation, or purchased at very low cost from coin dealers, online marketplaces, or even your local bank. 5. **Learn About Grading:** Understanding coin grading—from Poor (P-1) to Mint State (MS-70)—will help you assess value and quality. The Sheldon scale is the standard in the industry.

Choosing Between Circulated and Uncirculated Coins

One of the first decisions you will face as a collector is whether to aim for circulated or uncirculated quarters. Circulated coins are those that have been used in everyday transactions and show signs of wear. They are generally inexpensive and can be found in pocket change. Uncirculated coins, on the other hand, have never been used and retain their original mint luster. They are slightly more expensive but offer greater detail and visual appeal. For most beginners, a circulated set is a fantastic way to start, and you can always upgrade specific coins later.

KEY RARITIES AND VALUABLE QUARTERS IN THE SERIES

While most state quarters are common, **the Fifty United States Quarter Dollar Collection** includes several notable rarities that serious collectors seek out. Understanding these can help you recognize a potential treasure in your own collection. Some of the most sought-after varieties include:

- **1999 Delaware "Spitting Horse" Error:** A small die crack makes it look like the horse is spitting. This error is highly collectible.
- **2004 Wisconsin "Extra Leaf" Error:** Some Wisconsin quarters show an extra leaf on the corn stalk. This variety comes in two forms—high leaf and low leaf—and can be worth hundreds of dollars in high grade.
- **2005 Kansas "In God We Rust" Error:** A grease-filled die caused the lettering to appear as "In God We Rust" on some quarters. This error is quite popular among collectors.
- **2008 Hawaii Proofs and Silver Proofs:** The final issue in the series, especially in proof or silver proof format, is highly prized.

If you are lucky enough to come across any of these errors, it is wise to have them authenticated and graded by a professional service such as PCGS or NGC. Doing so can significantly increase the coin's marketability and value.

PRESERVING YOUR FIFTY STATE QUARTER COLLECTION

Proper preservation is essential to maintaining the condition and value of your quarters. Coins are sensitive to environmental factors such as moisture, temperature changes, and handling. Here are some best practices for keeping your collection in top shape:

- **Control the Environment:** Keep your collection in a cool, dry place away from direct sunlight. Bathrooms and basements are usually poor choices due to humidity.
- **Avoid Cleaning:** Never clean your coins with abrasive materials, liquids, or dips. Cleaning reduces the coin's value and can cause irreversible damage. A gentle rinse with distilled water may be acceptable for certain circulated coins, but it is best to consult an expert first.
