
How To Lose 15 Pounds In A Week

Increase Potassium-Rich Foods

Practice Intermittent Fasting or Prolonged Fasts

For more extreme results, some individuals attempt 24 to 48-hour fasts under supervision. This empties the digestive tract and rapidly depletes glycogen. However, fasting for extended periods carries risks including dizziness,

fatigue, and electrolyte imbalances.

Limit Fiber Intake Temporarily

SAMPLE ONE-DAY MEAL PLAN FOR RAPID LOSS

This sample plan is extremely low in carbohydrates, moderate in protein, and low in sodium. It is designed to maximize

water loss and keep you in a deep caloric deficit. Do not follow this for more than a few days without medical supervision.

- **Breakfast:** Two scrambled eggs cooked in coconut oil with a handful of spinach and a cup of black coffee.
- **Lunch:** Grilled chicken breast (6 ounces) over a large bed of mixed greens with cucumber, tomato, and a vinaigrette made from olive oil and lemon juice.
- **Snack:** A small avocado or a handful of almonds.
- **Dinner:** Baked salmon (6 ounces) with steamed asparagus and a side of sautéed zucchini.

Total approximate calories: 1,200 to 1,400. This creates a significant deficit for most adults when combined with daily exercise.

POTENTIAL RISKS AND IMPORTANT CONSIDERATIONS

Dehydration and Electrolyte Imbalance

Rapid water loss can lead to dehydration, which causes headaches, dizziness, fatigue, and constipation. Severe cases can lead to kidney stress
